## PUNK PLAYING IS CAUSE OF DEFEAT

### Beavers Blow Up in Ninth and Allow Angels Seven Gift Runs.

After taking four close and hotly played games from Los Angeles, and having yesterday's affair all but won, the Beavers went to pieces in the ninth and allowed the southerners a humiliating victory. It was the worst bunch of brainstorms the local fans have ever been subjected to in the memory of the most ancient bug.

Buddy Ryan's clean three-bagger after Casey had been chased to the bench after three wild swings, put us in the running right at the outset. Well, Tom Raftery blew in the light psychological moment and laid down a sacrifice that for neatness and dispatch rivaled anything pulled off locally. Buddy raced in from third and one run was recorded. Johnson swiped the ball safely, but died on the initial sack when Raftery was thrown out by Bernard.

Bassey pulled off his second hit of the series, but died on second. He came near not reaching the station and the fact that Delmas was off the bag prevented the southerners from completing a fast double play. Madden hit to Hosp, who shot the sphere to Del, who relayed it to first in time to entice Madden, although the Beaver backstop raced to first like a Rector.

It was in this game second inning that the visitors rang the bell twice. Smith started the bee with a single, and was sacrificed to second. After that Hosp took a tuck in his belt, pulled down his cap and settled to business. He bled in the third for three straight innings, finally giving away to Nagle in the ninth. "Adopting" the hopes of the home boys after he had pitched the bases on two passes and Delmas' error. A double play put the kibosh on the white garmented tossers, after Casey had been mugged trying to pilfer second base. But that awful ninth. It's too horrible to recall. ## DANIELS WINS 100 METER SWIM AT OLYMPIC GAMES

London, July 20.—Favoritism shined the athletes representing the United Kingdom by the judges of the Olympic games threatens to result today in the withdrawal of teams from several competing countries. ## THRILLING RIP GREAT SPORT IN CLUB LOW JINKS

### Pilot of United States Tells Adventures in Trip Through Air.

(United Press Leased Wire.)  
Minneapolis, Minn., July 20.—A. E. Mueller, pilot of the balloon United States, which was a competitor in the International balloon race Saturday, arrived here today after one of the most thrilling adventures of modern air navigation. He is so thankful that he escaped with his life that he has no complaints to make.

"We had an up-and-down journey for the first 50 miles," said Mueller, "and then we suddenly began to descend with great rapidity. I was very nervous. I had cast over all the ballast already to keep the balloon in the air. When I saw we were going into the trees, I threw out the drinking water and half-unfastened the drag rope. The rope was crashing along from tree to tree, and the situation became desperate. I cut it loose. "As soon as the rope was released we shot straight up in the air 3,000 feet. We made that ascent in about seven minutes, and then we began to drop again. We were coming down rapidly and I threw out everything that was likely to be dangerous. "Overboard went the revolvers, food and all the extra clothing, with the exception of a few articles. Even then we hit hard and the balloon bounced 300 feet into the air and finally landed at the other side of a great field."

### Northwest Winds and Excessive Heat Interferes With Fast Time.
