LONG RELAY RACE SETS NEW RECORD

Young Y. M. C. A. Athletes Hours Ahead in New York to Chicago Run.

Chicago, July 21.—John Martin, an 18-year-old youth, dashed up La Salle street in a splendid finishing sprint, between lines of cheering spectators, and delivered a silver tube containing a message of greeting from Mayor George B. McClellan of New York to Mayor Fred A. Busse of Chicago, who was waiting for it on the steps of the city hall, at 9:40 o'clock this morning.

This ended the great relay race of the Y. M. C. A. athletes from New York to Chicago, 11 hours and 50 minutes ahead of the schedule, shattering all records.

Martin is a member of the Oak Park Y. M. C. A. and holds a record of 52 and a fraction second for a quarter mile. He made the dash from Jackson boulevard to the city hall in beautiful form.

More than 2,000 runners participated in the great race, having been stationed at relay points varying from one mile to a mile and a half apart.

The Chicago athletes took up the race at South Bend, Ind., at 7:40 o'clock last evening and all night long raced ahead with the New York mayor's greeting, determined to uphold the honor of their city in the final stages of the race.
