

# ADMIRAL DIED HEARTBROKEN

## Russians Recognize Rojstevsky's Merits, Now That He Is Dead.

(United Press Leased Wire.)  
St. Petersburg, July 21.—Dispatches today from Badenauheim, Germany, say Admiral Rojstevsky died of a broken heart as the result of sorrow and distress.  
Representations are being made here today for a demonstration in honor of the admiral who had been much beloved because he heroically pleaded guilty of being a deserter from the Russian fleet in the battle of the sea of Japan, voluntarily taking the death penalty in his own hands.  
Political conditions are such, however, that it is probable the funeral will be unostentatious and without display.  
The circumstances of the death of Rojstevsky have touched the hearts of the Russian people and sorrow is widespread.  
The papers recount at length his self-sacrifice when, after being blamed for the loss of the Russian fleet. When the ships were surrendered Rojstevsky was wounded and practically unconscious, and could have made a strong personal defense if he had desired. His death sentence was commuted by the German government.  
In the later days of his life he lived and suffered confinement and the advice from the German town where he found refuge say there is no doubt his heart was broken.

# OLD AGE PENSION BILL WILL PASS

## British Socialists Rejoice While Rosebery Predicts European War.

London, July 21.—Socialists are rejoicing today over what they consider the greatest victory they have won in 40 years, the passing to second reading in the house of lords of the old age pension bill, which seems assured of becoming a law. The bill was passed after a bitter fight in which the United States pension system was denounced by Lord Rosebery.  
Lord Cromer aided Rosebery in his fight on the bill. He admitted it was the greatest mistake he had ever made before the house for many years and predicted that its passage would result in the adoption of a protective policy.  
Expressing the belief that a European conflict would be forced upon Great Britain before many years had passed, Lord Rosebery declared it was the first duty of the country to prepare itself for such a condition. A protective policy, he said, would tend to widen the breach between Great Britain and foreign nations and increase the danger of war.

# MYSTERY IN DEATH OF McCLANAHAN

## Wealthy Nevada Mining Man Is Thought to Have Been Poisoned.

Los Angeles, Cal., July 21.—Efforts are being made today to solve the mystery which surrounds the death of James C. McClanahan, a wealthy Nevada man, who practically owned the town of Sand Springs, California, and was found in his room at the Natick house late yesterday under strange circumstances. Coming here Thursday to have his eyes treated, McClanahan appeared to be in good health. When his body was found yesterday his face was distorted in such a manner as to indicate that he had died in terrible pain and it is believed he was poisoned.  
A bottle of medicine partially emptied was found in the room and it is thought some mistake may have been made in compounding it.  
The dead man, who was a bachelor, 67 years old, was known throughout Nevada. He grabbed many prospectors during his life and in that way acquired many valuable mines and was wealthy.

# NEW SUPERINTENDENT OF SHASTA DIVISION

## W. H. Whalen Is Taken From Chicago & Northwestern to Handle Mountain Line.

San Francisco, July 21.—W. H. Whalen, formerly superintendent of the Iowa division of the Chicago & Northwestern Railroad, has been chosen by the Southern Pacific as superintendent of the Shasta division of the road, which includes 250 miles of line, from Red Bluff, Cal., to Astoria, Or., with the new line now being built from Weed, in Shasta county, to Klamath Falls, Or. Whalen is taking the way to Dunsmuir to assume charge of his new division.  
Whalen has been in railroad work for the past 41 years and is well known in almost every portion of the United States.

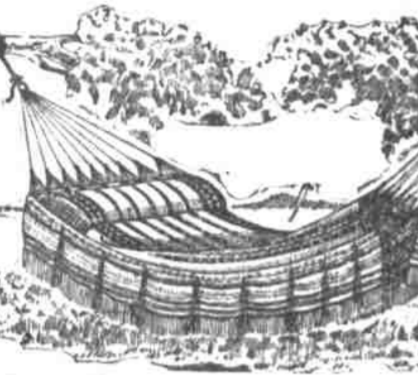

# JAPAN TAKES STEP FORWARD

Progressive Policies Inaugurated in Handling Affairs of Railroad.  
(United Press Leased Wire.)  
Tokyo, July 21.—The first of the policies of the progressives to be inaugurated in Japan was announced today when an imperial order was issued directing that the affairs of the South Manchurian Railway Company and the administration of the Kwantung province should be controlled hereafter by the ministry of communications.  
This was the content of the much disputed proposal of Part Arraui out of the hands of the minister of war and puts in the control of what corresponds to the secretary of state in America.  
It is regarded here as one of the biggest victories for the progressives since the old Katsura cabinet was dissolved before the Russo-Japanese war and is but the beginning of an era of re-orientation on the part of the new Katsura cabinet.  
The imperial order is the first absolute indication that Japan will keep its hands off Russia, England and China in the administration of the Manchurian railway as the army will no longer be able to control the destinies of the country.  
It is regarded as the first step in the longed-for affairs of the railway company have been the subject of much diplomatic comminution since the end of the war between Japan and Russia.

# BIG CORPORATIONS GIVE CHEAP ALIEN LABOR ITS FINISH

Pittsburg, July 21.—Illiterate foreigners are barred from employment at the works of the H. C. Frick Coke company, the fuel and iron of the United States Steel corporation, and English-speaking workmen are being hired today to fill the vacancies at the Connelville plant. As the Frick company was one of the first corporations to advocate the employment of cheap foreign labor, the announcement that only Americans, or men who have lived in this country for a certain number of years, will be hired is greeted with joy in labor circles.  
The big homes are being built for the American workmen by several large corporations which have decided to abolish foreign labor, and in some instances plans are being drawn for towns to be settled and conducted by the workmen.  
So widespread has the movement against foreign labor become that steamship agencies in the Pittsburgh district have called instructions to Europe that 10,000 laborers who returned home during the financial stringency are not to come back to this country as their former employers will not give them work. The employers have decided that American labor is cheaper in the end and as the workmen are more intelligent and have the fact in their favor that they keep part of their wages in circulation here, while the foreigners ship most of their money out of the country.

# POLICEMEN ASSUME BRAND NEW ROLE OF LADIES IN WAITING

Many and varied are the duties of a policeman. He has to look out for sewer lids that have gone astray, he watches for fires, he shows drunks into the patrol wagon, he picks up lost children, and he does a thousand other things.  
But it is seldom that an officer is forced to act as a lady's maid. Patrolmen Hirsch and Waniens, however, can qualify as ladies in waiting at any time, for they have had experience.  
A woman, who has been in a North Tenth street boarding house for several days, had remained under the influence of liquor practically all the time. She was disturbing the other roomers, so the police were called last night. It was up to Hirsch and Waniens to get the woman out. She was found lying on the floor, robed in a maudlin smile and entirely helpless to dress herself or stand upon her feet. The policemen were puzzled what to do, but finally they singled out one piece of lingerie and tried it on. It seemed to fit, so they put on another. Patiently they labored with buttons and strings and clasps.  
At last the woman was fit to be taken to the street, and with a sigh of relief the policemen turned her over to Macon Simmons, who, strange to say, found most of the garments right end up.
