Steamers Prohibited From Speeding Through Local Harbor.

PROSECUTIONS CAN NOW BE PUSHED

Steamboat Men Will Be Unable to Escape Punishment on Plea of City Authorities Having No Authority Over River Channel.

Steamboat captains will be unable to appeal from a decision finding them for exceeding the speed limit of the Willamette river on the Columbia if in the vicinity of a dredger, on the ground of the regulation having been made by the Port of Portland without jurisdiction.

The secretary of war of the United States has approved the regulations of the Port of Portland and henceforth the master navigators will have to deal with Uncle Sam when they violate the regulations. A circular to that effect was received by the port authority James F. McIndoe, United States engineers' corps, and master mariners will be made acquainted with that effect this morning.

Section 4 of the river and harbor act of August 18, 1894, as amended by section 11 of the act of June 23, 1902, gives the secretary of war authority to prescribe the rules and regulations for the use, administration and navigation of any or all canals and similar works of navigation that now are, or that hereafter may be, owned, operated or maintained by the United States as in his judgment the public necessity may require.

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In pursuance of the above law, the following regulations are prescribed to govern the movement of vessels in the Willamette and Columbia rivers:

PUTS INTO RIO JANEIRO.

British Ship Arctic Stream Was Probably in Hurricane.

A message to the Merchants' Exchange announced that the British ship Arctic Stream, Captain Dixon, put into Rio Janeiro yesterday while en route from this port to Liverpool with a cargo of wheat.

The message does not state the reason for the vessel putting into port, but it is supposed that the ship was disabled in doubling Cape Horn, as severe weather is known to have existed there about the time the Arctic Stream was en route from the Atlantic side about two months ago.

DETAINED BY FOGS.

Several Coasters Reach Wharves Late but in Good Condition.

Dense fogs and strong headwinds with heavy seas were responsible for the late arrivals of a number of coasters during the night. All report similar experiences.

On the way north she picked up a fishnet with a fisherman who was being carried out by the current. There was not a breath of breeze at the time and the fisher took the net without any objection. The fisherman had been out about 48 hours as they told Chief Officer Peterson of the City of Panama, but he had not suffered from want of food or water.

THE BEST DELEGATES TO TRAVEL IN SPECIAL CARS

It was announced this morning that the Kosmos liner Assuan will leave from Portland on her trip round the world, voyaging by way of the Pacific, Magellan on August 12, or about two weeks after the liner Radames calls here.

The Kosmos line has just recently placed Portland on its route and it is understood that henceforth every other liner will call here on the Pacific coast. The Radames is booked to sail from this port the latter part of this month and from San Francisco August 12.
