OAKLAND COPS OPENING GAME

Graney's Generosity and Marshall's Ineffectiveness Allow Greek Victory.

Captain Casey hearkened to the call of the wild yesterday's game with the Oakland team and chased Pitcher Graney in the fourth inning after the little Clevelander had given the visitors four bases on balls. Slim Marshall was trotted out, but the Greeks had whetted their batting eyes and the slants of the tall sycamore were greedily gobbled up. The Oaks won, 8 to 2, every man that Graney passed in the fourth scoring.

The visitors grabbed everything in the hitting line from a homerun to a single. Miller, the new shortstop, Van Halgren and Loucks vied in the hit column with three each. Graney pitched effective ball until the third inning. He passed Helms Heilmuller, Truck Egan, Miller and Altman in a row.

One man was out when Graney gave away in favor of Marshall. Loucks and Van Halgren then singled and three men crossed the plate.

The Greeks made it two more in the fifth. Egan slung Marshall for two bases. Truck went to third when Casey fozzled Hogan's grounder. Miller singled and Truck scored and Hogan registered when Casey went wrong again on Altman's grounder. Miller's homer to the right field fence, which dropped between the two sections, made it seven runs in the seventh and Loucks' three-bagger and Van Halgren's long sacrifice to McCredie made it one more in the eighth.

All Portland could do was to shove two across in the third. Graney, Casey and Ryan singled in succession. Graney tried to make third and was caught on a perfect peg from Van Halgren. Johnson filled the bags when he got four wide ones and Loucks' second single brought two men home.

PORTLAND YOUTHS IN SMALL CANOE BRAVE RAPIDS AND MOSQUITOES, TOO

(Salem Bureau of the Journal.) Salem, Or., July 22.—Harvey Hutchings and Ernest Bruce, two young men of Portland, arrived in Salem yesterday morning after having paddled the distance in a canoe, a feat that was probably never attempted before.

The young men are employed by the Portland Gas company and are also members of the East side Athletic club and the Y. M. C. A. Leaving Portland last Friday evening at 6:30, the boys were on the river about three days and four nights together.

The first rest was made at Wilsonville, the distance from Portland having nine hours in three days. The canoeing was more difficult on account of rapid water, and much wading and roping was necessary. The boys also had a sail, which they used to good advantage.

Much of the distance was covered in half-day shifts because of the heat, and Hutchings and Bruce are of the opinion that their record could be beaten easily by a team from Salem Monday evening instead of Tuesday morning had they wished, though every farmer and stowabout hand met during the trip gave the boys little encouragement and said it could not be done.

After leaving Wilsonville the next stop was made at Mission, then at Fairfield, and Monday night the canoeists rested at Kasper's bottom, not far from Salem. Mosquitoes were the greatest difficulty met with, and the heat in the daytime prevented fast work. The Salem canoe club has extended every courtesy to the Portland boys, and has set them up during their stay here, furnishing not only free board and lodging, but canoe room in the club house.

BAD BRUIN THREE KILLED IN TREE EACH DAY MAKES NINE FOR MR. LEE

(United Press Lead Wire.) Redding, Cal., July 22.—Hunters of Tehama county today proclaimed Leo Green, of Red Bluff, the champion bear slayer of California, his record being nine bears in three days. He killed them by trios, in three trees. Green today collected \$45 bounty from the county clerk, \$15 for the scalp of each bear.

While hunting in the Mount Tom head country last week Green saw a bear devouring a calf. He fired at the animal, and it ran up a tree, where its two cubs were already perched. Green killed all three.

On the following day he saw three more bears less than a mile from the tree where he had bagged three the day before. Like the others, the bears were killed by climbing a tree and were easily killed by the hunter.

The third day Green saw four bears. Three of these ran up a tree, while the fourth made it into the brush. Green killed the three which remained within range.

BEAVERS NOT A SET OF LUSHERS

Manager McCredie Resents Inference That Players Have Been Drinking.

"The players on my baseball team do not drink any more than any business man in Portland and statements that they have been lushing are without foundation. By inferring an evening paper would make drunkards out of three-fourths the members of the team, I have looked after the men all summer and I have never seen a more gentlemanly, temperate lot of ball players in my life, and I have traveled in both the major and minor leagues."

This was the statement made last night by Manager Walter McCredie of the Portland ball team.

"We have been trying our best to win games and when our team was in an injured state and inside ball playing impossible, we were criticized. Even when we won four out of six games from the leaders we got no credit. We have unfortunately been visited by sickness all spring and summer and have had no chance to travel at our best and make a spurt for the top."

"But so far as lushing or nightly intemperance is concerned, there is nothing to it.
