LIQUOR MEN IN COUNCIL DEFEAT URGENT MEASURE

One of the cleverest displays of politics ever enacted on the floor of the city council was led yesterday by Councilman Kellaher and resulted in the defeat of Councilman Driscoll's ordinance prohibiting saloonkeepers from allowing women to enter saloons. The defeat of the measure was caused by adding amendments to the ordinance until its original intent was unrecognizable even to Driscoll.

Kellaher was actively backed in the fight by Baker, Belding and Cottel, and when it came time to vote for the measure as amended, the members who had been fighting for months to pass it refused to vote for it on the ground that it was so drastic that it could not be enforced.

Encouraged by the increasing votes the enemies of the ordinance again offered his amendment. This was defeated by the others because the amendment had already been voted on. President Rushlight, who was presiding, said that the amendment had been voted on but not an amendment to the ordinance.

His amendments made it impossible for them to do so because, as was freely predicted on the floor, if the measure was passed, Mayor Lane would necessarily have to veto it.

MINORITY WINS FIGHT FOR CHAIR

Rushlight Elected President of Council—First Taste Seasoned With Pepper.

With the majority party of the council completely disorganized the minority party elected Councilman A. G. Rushlight yesterday afternoon to succeed Councilman A. N. Willis as president of the council for the ensuing year. All efforts of the majority party to agree on a successor to head the council failed and at last in their desperation the members of the majority compromised to give the honor to Councilman A. G. Rushlight, who is said to have declined it.

This final blow completed the disruption of the majority, which began when Driscoll left the majority party, and the latter councilman was enabled to triumph over his former confederates and secure the downfall of his arch-enemy, Willis.

Rushlight's election proved most popular to the members and he was called upon to make a speech. Mayor Lane invited Rushlight to the chair and allowed him to preside over the rest of the meeting. Rushlight thanked the councilmen for the honor conferred upon him and said that he would endeavor to be impartial in his rulings. He called upon the councilmen to aid him in the work and asked that they conduct business on strictly parliamentary lines in order to facilitate its transaction.

Intitiated by Hot Fight. That Rushlight is capable of carrying out the duties of a presiding officer was shown by the able manner in which he handled the councilmen through one of the most turbulent sessions ever held. At the conclusion of the meeting he was surrounded by Mayor Lane and the councilmen, who congratulated him upon his decisions and the manner in which he carried through his business. This is Rushlight's second term as councilman and he is counted on as one of the ablest members of the city's legislative body.

TOOK WHOLE CASH REGISTER TO PAY DEBT

Chris Pleckas was taught a smattering of the English language and then did not pay his teacher's bill. Consequently he has no cash register today. Miss Sadie Harrison was the teacher.
