

WOMEN OF COAST LIFT VEILS

Depth of the Young Turkey Movement Shown in Astounding and Unprecedented Defiance of Religion and Custom.

Parliament Trade Taken as Evidence of Terror and Incites to New Zeal for the Cause of Revolution and Liberty.

BRYAN REJOICES. Chicago, July 25.—"I am glad to see that Turkey has gone Democratic."

Berlin, July 25.—Dispatches received here today from Monastir state that the women of all Macedonia are parading the streets unveiled, rejoicing in the granting of the new constitution by the Sultan.

The parades are the result of an order issued by a Moslem priest canceling the command of the Koran that all women must wear veils in public, and for the first time in centuries the women of Turkey have exposed their faces to the public eye.

The Koran commands absolutely that no woman of the faith can appear outside her house without a veil covering her entire face with the exception of a slit for her eyes.

With the religious element on its side, the revolution in Macedonia assumes a more serious aspect and it is thought that it will be hard for the sultan to overcome the dissatisfaction without completely yielding to the demands of his European subjects.

According to the best information obtainable here the whole of Macedonia, instead of being quieted by the trade of yesterday calling for the reestablishment of the parliament, is riotous, because of the realization by the leaders of the "Young Turkey" movement that they have frightened Constantinople.

A statement given out here today by the leaders of the movement announces that the victorious rebels will not lay down their arms until they are assured that the call for the parliament means that the representation will be fair, without completely yielding to the demands of the sultan.
