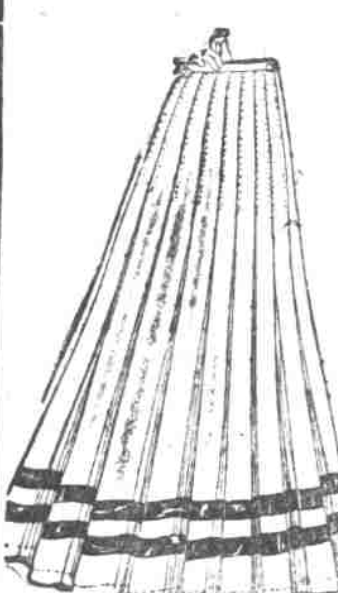

## SUMMERVILLE MAKES THREAT

Gives Warning to School Board He Will Make Public His Report.

The protest of the competing architects against the action of the school board in awarding the design of the Albina High school, and their demand that the report of Architect Summerville be published, has been made public. The report was considered at the board meeting yesterday afternoon, and the whole meeting referred to the building committee. The entire affair was handled in a dignified manner, leaving the impression that the members of the board were fully aware of their ground and were afraid that the six competing architects, who precipitated the trouble, had them in hole. It is understood the board has received a letter from Architect Summerville requesting that his report, making the award be published and incidentally conveying the threat that if the board refused to make public his report, he would publish it himself. In discussing the architects' protest, a member of the board took the position that Architect Summerville was not a jury to select the best plan for the proposed Albina High school, but was simply called in to get in an advisory capacity and that the school board was the ultimate jury to make the award. When the attention of the members was called to the following paragraph in the specifications issued by the board: "The board of education will accept the recommendation of the jury, and the author or authors of the selected design shall be employed as the architect of the building," he said that the report of the jury, while definitely selecting one plan, criticized all of the

## NEXT YEAR ALL STREETS TO BE OILED

## HOOD RIVER APPLE MEN OPPOSE BILL

It provides for change in the size of the apple box recognized and adopted by the Northwest Fruit Growers' association as a standard, and which is stated to contain 2.15 cubic inches, or slightly more than the Winchester bushel, at present accepted as the standard bushel in the United States. The box which the shippers recommend, and which is specified in the bill, will contain 2.584 cubic inches, or 42.6 cubic inches more than the box now used by the association. It is said by authorities on the matter that if the new law goes into effect it will cause a loss to Pacific coast growers of \$1,000,000 annually. It is also stated that an additional cost will be incurred on account of the larger size of the box, as it will take more lumber to manufacture it. The bill was introduced during the latter part of the last session of congress by Representative Porter of New York, but was not reported. This year the shippers have taken it up and expect to secure its passage at the coming session.

## ALBINA FAVORS DES MOINES WAY

Tired of repeated promises on the part of the city council without any result the people of North Albina, through their improvement club, adopted resolutions last night favoring the inauguration of a new form of city government patterned after that in operation at Des Moines, Iowa. This provides for a mayor and four councilmen to run the city. Each councilman and the mayor is at the head of a separate department of the municipal government and each is heavily bonded to insure the faithful execution of his duties. He is held absolutely responsible for his particular department. Des Moines is said to be satisfied with the plan there where it has been in operation for some time. H. G. Parsons of Des Moines addressed the North Albina Improvement association at their meeting last night, explaining how the new plan of government worked in the Iowa city. At the conclusion of his address the club unanimously resolved that North Albina favored the new system and a committee of three was appointed to take up the matter with the advisory board on charter revision. These men will also be present at the regular meeting of the Federated East Side club, when they will ask the club to cooperate in an effort to secure better city government.

## WOMEN TURN OUT TO FIGHT A FIRE

Make Mops of Their Gowns and Save a Lot of Very Valuable Property.

(United Press Local Wire.) San Francisco, July 25.—There will be no bridge parties in the smart set at the fashionable San Anselmo and Fairfax residence districts until the hands of the society leaders are cured of the burns and blisters they sustained in their heroic work as volunteer fire fighters yesterday, when they undoubtedly saved several splendid residences from destruction. A stable boy dropped a cigarette in the dry grass at the place of Louis Carrigan. No men were near. Mrs. Carrigan rushed out to help the boy check the flames, but they spread rapidly and were advancing toward the house when reinforcements came from all sides. The women turned out in full force. They took off their outer skirts, soaked them in water and beat the fire. By persistent work in this fashion they overcame the fire, but signed hair and blackened faces, in addition to the blistered hands, gave their owners an awful shock when the enthusiasm of excitement wore off.

## NORTH END LOT TO BE IMPROVED

Lowensohn Bros. sold this morning to Eugene Hoch, the Fourth street wholesale liquor merchant, a 50-foot lot on the east side of Sixth street, between Flanders and Gilliam streets, for \$25,000. The property was purchased as an investment and will be immediately improved by Mr. Hoch in a way to make it a paying proposition. The sale was negotiated through the agency of Goshorn & Co.

## PUBLIC BATHS AT FOOT EAST MADISON

William M. Ladd came to the relief of the city authorities yesterday by offering them a site for the public baths at the foot of East Madison street, and the enterprise that for a time threatened to become an elephant on the city's hands will be moved as soon as possible from Jefferson street. The new location is practically free from sewer contamination and is expected to remove all the objections against the baths that have been raised.
