## MYSTERY IN LAND CASE

### Counsel for Defense Alleges That Government Is Casting Aspersions on Some of Their Methods—Night Visit From Witnesses.

Counsel for the defense in the Booth-Kelly conspiracy case before Judge Welton in the United States circuit court has claimed from the government were endeavoring to surround certain methods of the defendants with an air of mystery, and on this account Dan Malarkey this morning offered as evidence statements made to him in his office last week by several of the United States witnesses.

Booth, then receiver of the Roseburg land office, was on the stand this morning, and it was in the cross-examination that Mr. Malarkey brought out the fact that he had had Parker and several other witnesses subpoenaed by the government at his office one evening, and questioned them relative to the case at issue.

Mr. Becker brought out from the witness that they had visited Mr. Malarkey's office after dark. Mr. Malarkey then proceeded to show that the witness were in charge of the government officials all day and that only during the evening was it possible for him to hold the conference with them that he desired.

Too Much Mystery. Mr. Malarkey said that the government attorneys had been trying to make the defense mysterious and that on their account he would offer the typewritten statements made by Barker and the others in his office when they were all in one room together.

The court interfered in the debate and said that it didn't think that Mr. Becker had intimated anything irregular on the part of Mr. Malarkey or the other attorneys.

Agree's Residence on Claim. B. F. Russell of Thurston, LaMoore, a son of the late Dr. B. F. Russell, who received \$30 from the Booth-Kelly company for relinquishing the land on which the Agrees lived later, was on the stand this morning. Also Charles Clark, a rancher near Glyde, Douglas county. The testimony of these two men was to the effect that Agrees, as far as they knew, had only lived on his claim from 1903 until 1906. When he moved up on the land in question and which it is alleged by the government was taken up by Agrees for the express purpose of disposing of it to the Booth-Kelly company, Agrees swore that he had lived on it five years as required by law.

W. T. Strader, who has lived 55 years in Douglas county, was the only other witness examined during the morning session.

It is thought the government will finish with its witnesses within a day or two and that the case in all probability, will go to the jury the latter part of next week.

Charles Owen Atterbury and Samuel Britt were on the stand during yesterday afternoon. While subpoenaed by the government the testimony of the three witnesses as a whole was in a way favorable to the defendants.

## PENDLETON MAY NOT GRANT FRANCHISE

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Pendleton, Or., July 28.—As the matter now stands there is little hope of the city council granting an electric line franchise to J. H. Gwinn, who is representing eastern capitalists, unless he can show more definitely that his people will actually build a line within the life-time of the franchise. The matter was referred to the ordinance committee of the council, and the committee has recommended that the request be declined unless a better showing be made. To this end it was recommended that the grantee be required to give a bond guaranteeing that the road would be built.

## GOULD PUTS NEW LIGHT ON STANDARD OIL-LANDIS CASE

(United Press Leased Wire.) New York, July 28.—George J. Gould, the railway magnate, returned from Europe today with his wife, his daughter Margerie and his son Jay. Mr. Gould, in discussing the Standard Oil decision, said: "The reversal of the enormous fine imposed on the Standard Oil company by Judge Landis will go far toward restoring foreign confidence in American securities and advancing American credit abroad. I am hopeful of the future, and also believe that Taft should be elected."

## COLOR DELEGATE HAS SWELL HOTEL CLERKS IN FLURRY

(United Press Leased Wire.) Cincinnati, July 28.—The arrival of Joseph A. Lee, a coal black Florida negro, the only colored member of the Taft nomination committee, at the Stinton hotel today nearly raised a serious race question, but the trouble was smoothed away and Lee now bears the distinction of being the only negro ever received as a guest at the Stinton. Lee advised his room reserved by himself and the management of the hotel had no idea he was a negro from the letter. When he arrived today the clerks were astounded and there was consternation in general. The color line is distinct here and to allow a negro to enter the dining-room as a guest would mean the loss of much business.

## NEW SUPERINTENDENT TO BE APPOINTED

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Eugene, Or., July 28.—The selection of Professor L. R. Alderman as assistant professor of education at the Eastern High school, President A. L. Briggs Saturday leaves a vacancy in the city superintendency of Eugene's public schools. Professor Alderman having held that position during the past year. There are several men prominently mentioned for the position, among them being L. R. Traver, now a member of the Monmouth normal school faculty; Professor Marjette, principal of the Eastern High school; and A. L. Briggs of the Drain normal school. A selection will probably be made by the school board at its regular meeting on the first Wednesday in August.

## HYDROPHOBIA FROM HIS OWN DOG'S BITE

New York Detective, Bitten Nine Months Ago, Dies in Great Agony.

(United Press Leased Wire.) New York, July 28.—Doctors are today investigating one of the strangest cases of hydrophobia that has come under the notice of the Pasteur Institute for years. Police Sergeant James E. Phillips, who resigned from the force to establish a private detective agency a few months ago, died suddenly yesterday after but a few hours' illness in intense agony from the rabies. He had been inoculated with the disease over nine months ago by a bite on the cheek by a bull pup.

## ASSAILANT OF MISS ROBINSON IS UNCAUGHT

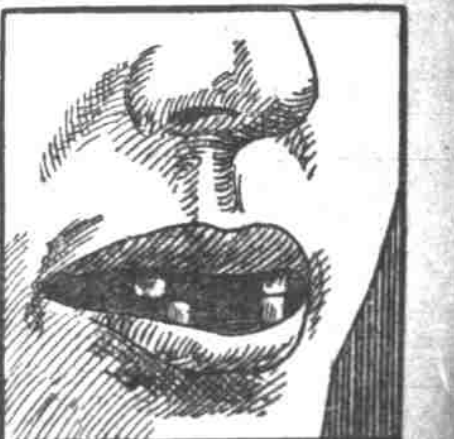
Former Portland Woman Still Resides in Lonely Mountain Cabin.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Grants Pass, Or., July 28.—An atmosphere of mystery still hangs around the mountain cabin out in Galice mining camp where Miss Emma Robinson, a former Portland school teacher, was brutally assaulted by an unknown masked man two weeks ago. Though Sheriff Russell and his deputies made a diligent and thorough search, they have not been able to locate even a semblance of a clue, and the perpetrator of the cowardly deed is still at large. The nurses of the camp also took it upon themselves to scour the woods and hold up every suspicious character, who entered or left Galice shortly after the assault, but were unsuccessful, though a number of suspects were required to give detailed accounts of themselves. Miss Robinson will add nothing to what has already been published. She says she can remember little about the man other than that he wore a mask, was a big fellow and had a deep, hoarse voice. She declares as true the report that has been circulated to the effect that the assault was a scheme concocted to get her off the claim, upon which she has squatted to secure her rights as a stockholder in the defunct Galice Consolidated Mines company. Her case recently came to court, and a decision is now pending in the company, believing it would "burn out" her. The company became involved in a series of law suits with T. K. Anderson, a neighbor miner, and lost out in every case with heavy damages to pay.

It was these suits, rather than a lack of gold in the mines, that led to the company's failure. Miss Robinson believes the old mines can yet be made to produce and is determined to get some sort of returns for herself and friends.
