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Judge Thomas O'Day has some positive views in regard to the recent decision of Judge Grosscup of the United States court of appeals in the Standard Oil case.

"In regard to the Standard Oil case there are two views of the matter. One of these views has been exemplified by the decision of Judge Landis and the other by the decision of the circuit court of appeals."

"The circuit court of appeals holds that this question of knowledge was a question of fact for the jury to determine. It also holds that each shipment does not constitute an offense and that the rate not having been on the regular traffic sheet does not control also that the penalty was excessive, at least in what is stated from the newspaper account."

"It is a matter of public history that the Standard Oil company has by secret rebates largely built up its great monopoly of the oil business. By this means it has been able to crush out all competitors and to obtain a control of nearly all the railroads in the United States."

"The public ownership of the railroads is a policy that the public ought not to have knowledge of its transactions, assuming it is a matter in which the public has an interest."

"It has been repeatedly denied that this is true, and the United States government and the various state governments have had great difficulty in obtaining them. Chief officers of the Standard Oil company could not find them."
