SHOULD LEARN RULES.
 Punishment Suggested for Persons Indirectly Responsible for Death.
 That persons indirectly responsible for another's death while boating should be held to some standard is an opinion generally voiced in consequence of the accident of Sunday night. Miss Thetta Stephens was drowned. At the investigation before the local inspectors yesterday, E. F. Jeannot, the young man with whom the girl went on the river for a boating, stated he knew nothing about marine signals and had been told by his father, before the fatal ride being his third. "While no doubt young Jeannot feels very badly over the sad affair," said an official at the custom house this morning, "some sort of steps should be taken to check this sacrifice of life through ignorance and recklessness. A man knowing nothing about the rules of navigation or the handling of a boat should be invited to take the girl to go boating with him, at least not during the dark hours of night. It might be a difficult problem to solve, but somehow a limit should be placed somewhere."

GETS OFF WITH SMALL FINE.
 Captain Good Pays \$50 for Carrying More Passengers Than Authorized.
 Captain George Good, owner of the steamer Columbia, who was fined \$50 a few days ago by Collector of the Customs National for exceeding the passenger limit on the fourth of July, will escape with the payment of \$50. Information to this effect was received by the collector of the department of commerce and labor this morning, and the collector will notify Captain Good to call and draw down the remainder of the fine which he had to put up at the time it was made. Captain Good operates the Columbia between Portland and Vancouver and was enjoying big business on the fourth. Somehow there happened to be 45 more passengers on board during the day than had been permitted by the authorities, and a fine of \$10 a head was placed against the boat and its owner. The case was appealed to the department of commerce and labor, where it was held that instead of \$50 the fine should have been \$500, but not wishing to be severe, the fine was reduced to \$50.

DOINGS AT SHIPYARDS.
 Activity Resumes After Several Weeks Idleness.
 Activity is beginning to resume at the shipyards about Portland. The Portland Shipbuilding Company's plant in south Portland put a large number of men to work Monday after having been idle for about a month. Two large barges are on the ways for the diamond line and these keep a large force busy. The St. Johns yards are busy building a number of scows for the Port of Portland and doing some repair work.

ALONG THE WATERFRONT.
 The steamer City of Panama sails for Coos Bay this evening. The steamer City of Panama is due to arrive at San Francisco today, and should reach here about August 8. The lightship Columbia arrived in the harbor last night and went to Mersey dock to take on supplies for the light stations along the coast. Captain James Fremont Pond, light-house inspector of this district, leaves this morning for Astoria to join the tender Armeria, which is to take the inspector on his annual trip of inspection along the Alaskan coast. The inspector will be gone two months. W. H. Baker, agent for Oak street dock and the Coos Bay line of the Southern Pacific company, returns this morning from California, where he spent the last three weeks lecturing for the Hills Students' association of Alameda. Mr. Baker during his absence traveled 3,225 miles and delivered lectures in 16 cities.
