

RECEPTION TO ATHLETES

Home-Coming of Oregon Boys Who Won Honors in London Will Be Memorable Event—Many Clubs to Participate.

Under the auspices of the Multnomah club, assisted by Portland commercial bodies and other organizations, the homecoming of Oregon's athletes from the Olympic games at London will be made a memorable event. A joint committee will meet at the convention hall of the Portland Commercial club Friday evening to discuss plans for the reception and entertainment.

The committee is made up of men from the Multnomah club, the Commercial club, the chamber of commerce, the Manufacturers' association, the board of trade, the Elks club, the University club, the Portland Automobile club, Oregon Agricultural college, University of Oregon, and the Pacific university of Forest Grove. Reasons for participation by the three last named are that the athletes were at some time students at those institutions.

The Multnomah club committee will be composed of its board of directors, Messrs. A. A. Morrison, H. C. Campbell, James F. Ewing.

The Commercial club will be represented by George W. Simons. S. Berg has been appointed as a delegate from the Portland Ad club.

The welcoming ceremony will probably take the form of a dinner to be given at the Portland Commercial club and a great reception on Multnomah field.

BOY STOLE COIN FROM TRUNK

Fred Fraley Took a Trip to San Francisco and Spent It All.

Fred Fraley, bad boy, who vanished from Portland some time ago with \$100 that his aunt had carefully saved for him, and returned after he had "blown in" the coin, was lodged in the county jail this morning by Probation Officer Krum, who is looking after the work of the juvenile court while Chief Probation Officer Hadley is on vacation.

Fred was arrested on a warrant charging him with incorrigibility, the complaint having been made by his aunt. Fred is about 14 years of age and an orphan. For a long time he has lived with his aunt, who has had a hard struggle supporting herself, the boy and the boy's grandmother. The aunt is separated from her husband, but is not divorced, and he lives next door. Lately the boy has been staying with his uncle, and it is charged that he keeps matters stirred up and annoys the aunt, who is now helplessly sick. The officers found a good job for him, but he worked only two days.

The lad will appear before Judge Gantenbein in the juvenile court tomorrow, when a decision will be reached as to what should be done with him. When he left the city about two months ago he went to San Francisco, but came back when the money gave out. He had earned the money, which his aunt saved for him and put in a trunk. One day when no one else was home he found the key to the trunk and made away with the money.

AGED WIDOW GETS \$35,000 ESTATE

Mrs. Virginia McDaniel Receives All of Husband's Property.

Mrs. Virginia A. McDaniel, 80 years of age, becomes the sole heir to the \$35,000 estate of her late husband, Josiah McDaniel, under the will filed today. There are four sons and one daughter surviving, ranging in age from 49 to 50 years, and their father explains in his will that he has kept them all in mind, as well as three grandchildren, but is confident that his wife will deal justly with all of them.

McDaniel died on July 6, leaving real estate valued at \$9,000 in Multnomah, Clackamas and Polk counties, and about \$25,000 worth of personal property. The widow and W. H. Eukerson are named to look after the estate. The children are Andrew J. McDaniel of Rock Creek, Willis H. McDaniel of Dalles, and Hannah E., Newton M. and Lee H. McDaniel of Portland.

SOCIALISTS STILL HAVE RIGHT IN STREET

Complaints Against Free Speakers Not Sufficiently Clear to Hold.

Until complaints are drawn up that will stick in court, the police will not attempt to stop street meetings of Socialists.

As predicted in Monday's Journal, the Socialist orators tested the power of the officers to drive them from Sixth street near Washington by holding meetings there Monday evening, but as the case of the four men arrested Sunday afternoon for refusing to move on

and interfering with an officer at the Plaza blocks did not come up in the municipal court until yesterday afternoon, the Socialists were allowed on Sixth street until a decision could be reached.

Goodwin, Jackson, Lloyd and Closest, the men arrested, were released yesterday because C. E. S. Wood, who it is understood, offered his services to them in the interest of free speech, succeeded in having his demurrer sustained in the municipal court yesterday. He declared the complaints were not sufficiently specific, and Judge Van Zante agreed with him. It was not set forth that the streets were being obstructed when the officers ordered the Socialists to move on.

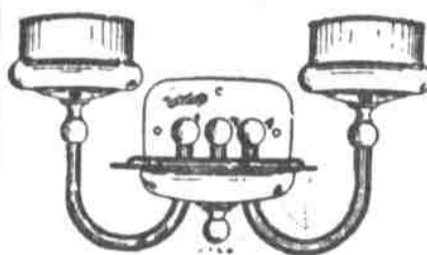

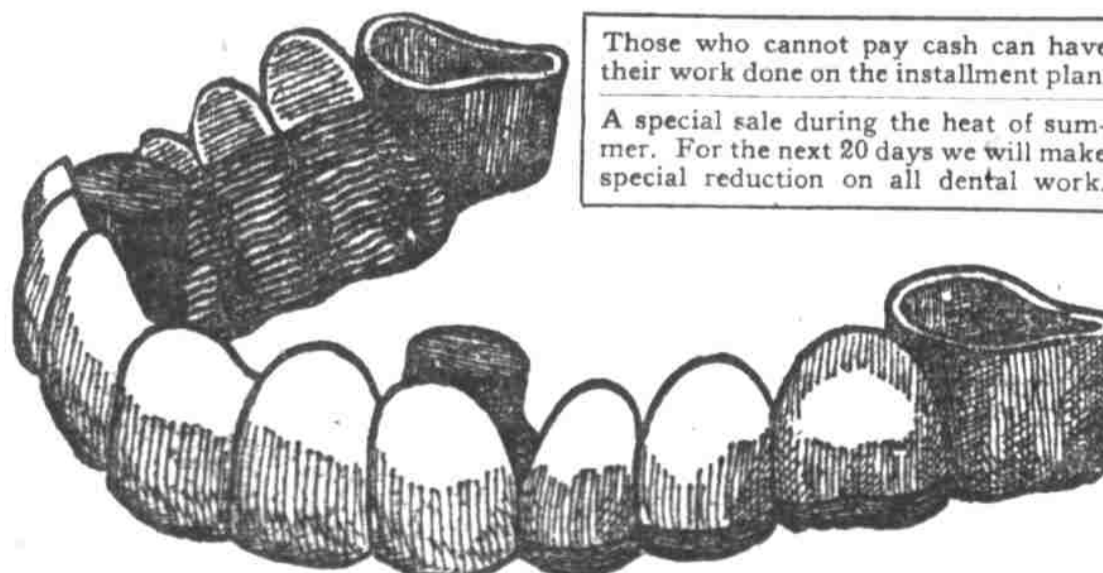
