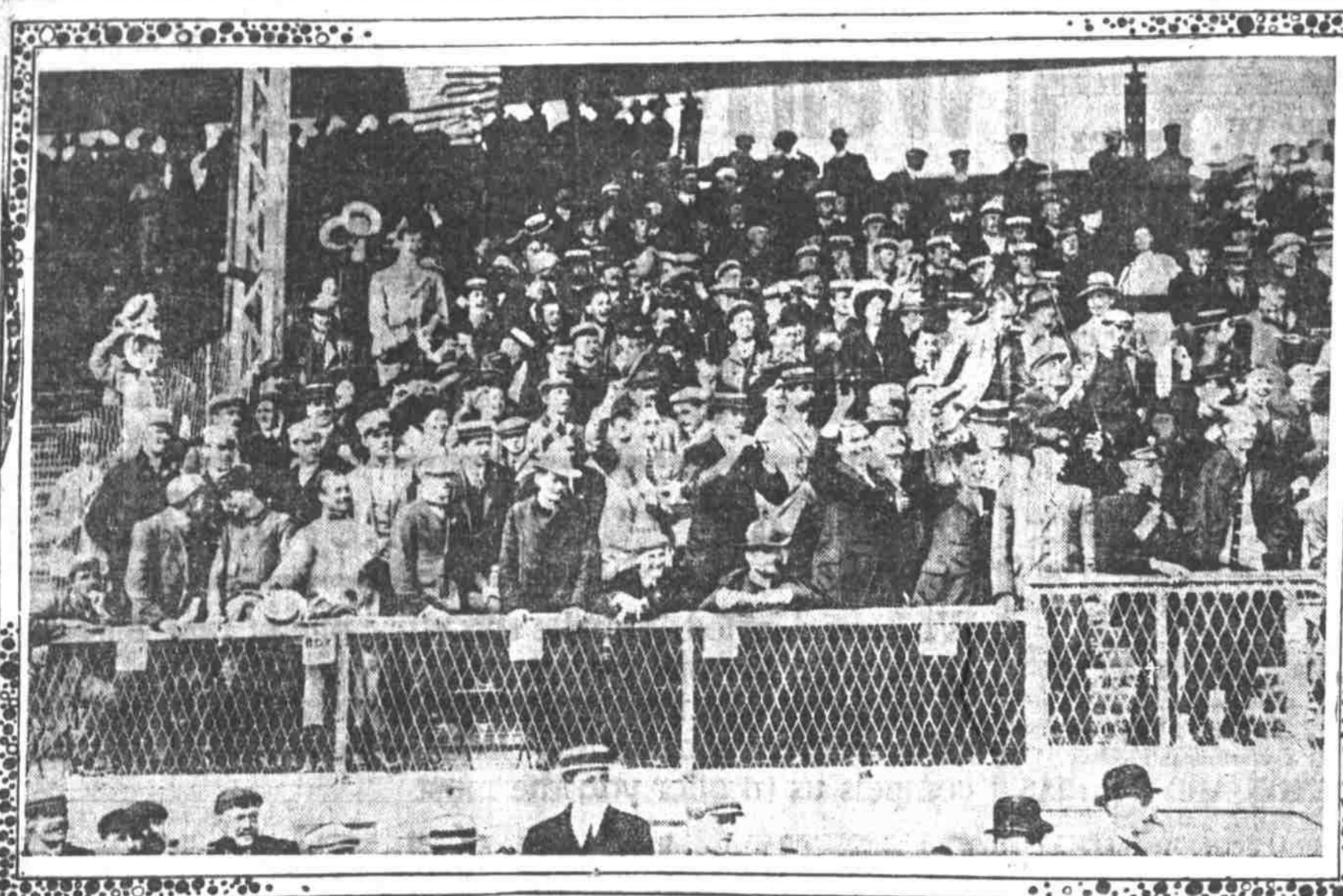


THE AMERICAN CHEERING SECTION AT THE STADIUM
