Pay Small Depositors. The report shows a surplus in book accounts of assets over liabilities of \$45,855. The actual value of the assets is lower than they are carried on the books, however, and regarding many of these assets it is impossible to tell just how much will be realized.

The total number of claims of all classes is 7,500, amounting to \$1,804,556. The total number filed and allowed is 1,800, amounting to \$247,124, not including the claim of Ladd & Tilton for \$67,226, which is subordinate in time and rank by direction of W. T. Ladd. The cash now available to the payment of claims is \$187,499. There are 2,700 claims neither filed or presented, amounting to \$67,856.

Settle With Other Concerns. Through proceedings now in progress in the courts it is expected to secure favorable settlement of the bank's claims against the Colonial Investment company and the Portland Development company, two corporations subsidiary to the old bank and having valuable property holdings at the Lewis and Clark exposition grounds. Prospects are also good for realizing money from the Oregon Land and Water company's irrigation project at Irigdon. Receiver will probably be able to pay all the bank's liabilities in full within the two and three-year limits fixed by the court for settlement of claims.
