Health Board Recommends Appropriation Providing for Inspectors and School Nurse to Stop Ravages of Diphtheria.

Mortality From Disease High During the School Months—Health Precautions Heretofore Ignored—\$3,000 Asked for.

Pohl to ask the council for an appropriation providing for two paid inspectors and a school nurse for the coming year.
