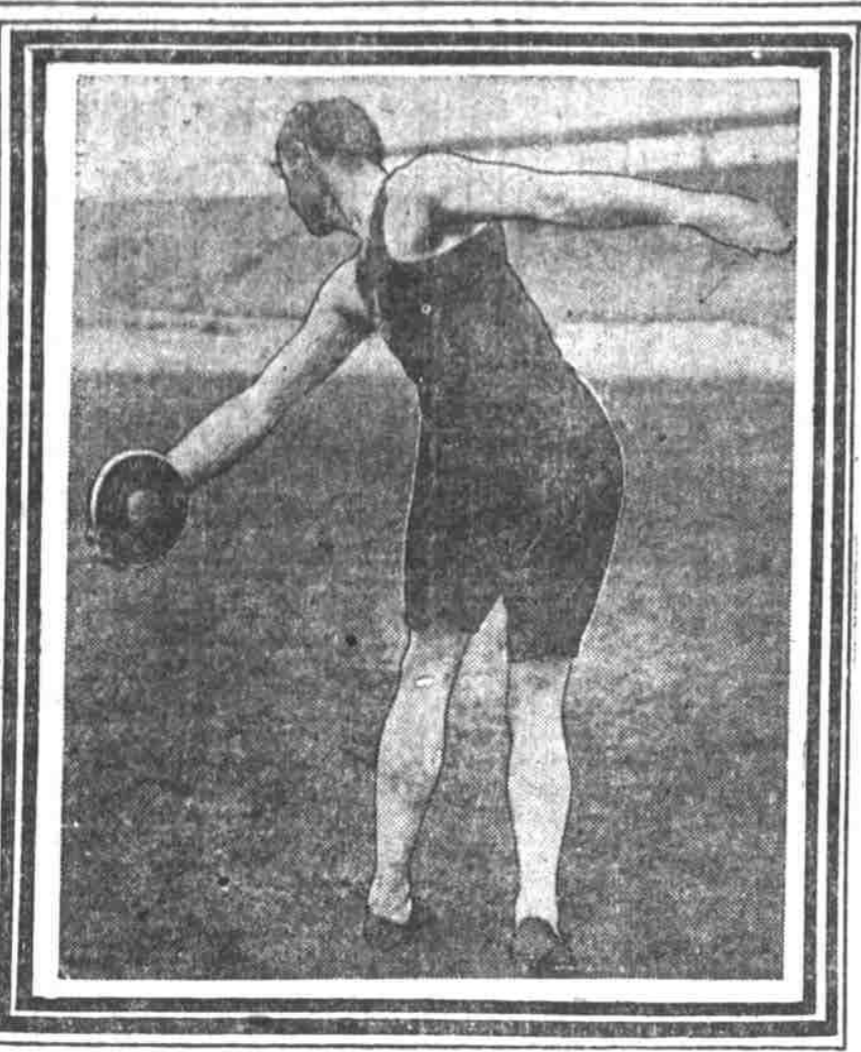

Geatman's road race—Toy Lane, J. A. Abbott, Forest Grove, time, 2:45.

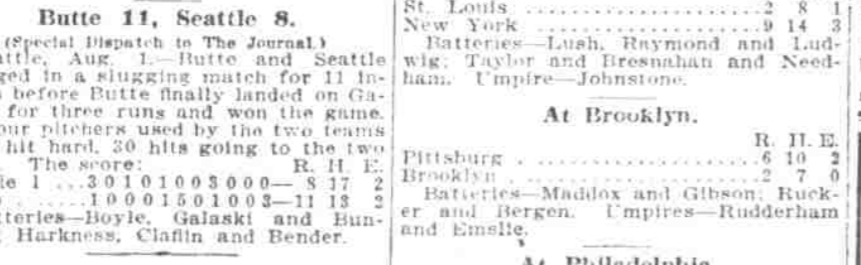

FAMOUS PUNCH FLOORS KELLY

(Champion Stanley Ketchel Wins From the Chicago Man in Three Rounds.) San Francisco, Aug. 1.—Stanley Ketchel of Grand Rapids clinched his title to the middleweight championship last night, when three rounds of fast fighting gave him the victory over Hugo Kelly.

The end came suddenly and unexpectedly, for Kelly had made a good showing in the first and second rounds, and Ketchel simply delivered three swift blows to the jaw so quickly that Kelly did not have time to gather himself for action.

Every seat in the Coliseum was taken long before time for the fight to begin, making a 20,000 crowd. Ketchel came into the ring at odds of 10 to 4.

In the first round Kelly seemed to have the measure of the first and second rounds, and the champion received several hard jolts. The Chicago challenger likewise had the best of a mixup, but his left stomach was closed by a savage drive near the close of the round.

In the second the men fought hard, and Kelly again sent some heavy ones to the champion's stomach and jaw. It looked good for Kelly when the men came up for the third, but Ketchel in a lightning caught Kelly on the jaw with his left, repeated the dose without difficulty, and then gave the finishing touch in the seventh round.

In the third round of what was to have been a 10-round bout, Young Blue Dan, champion welterweight of the navy, defeated George Peterson, former lightweight champion in that class. The police stopped the argument, the navy man getting the decision.

In the fourth round of what was to have been a 10-round bout, Kelly and Ketchel slipped to the floor, a wicked mixup followed, Ketchel putting a right to the head, and Kelly sending right and left to the body. As Kelly backed away Ketchel caught him on the jaw with a left.
