

EMPEROR VERY ILL

China's Ruler Sinking Slowly and Best Physicians of Orient Have Been Called Into Consultation—Revolution Is Threatened.

 Peking, Aug. 1.—It became known here today that the high officials of the government are exceedingly concerned over the outlook because of the serious illness of the emperor and the general belief that it will be necessary to establish a constitutional government to prevent a general revolution. The emperor is falling rapidly and there is little hope that he can survive for many weeks. The best physicians of the orient have been called to attend him.

The ominous murmurings of the impending revolution have been heard with fear and trembling by those officials who give the matter most serious consideration.

There is no question, however, that a change in the form of government is bound to come soon and that the ancient system of rule at least must be modified to conform with the advance of civilization.

In case of the emperor's death it has been determined to open a parliament during the lifetime of the dowager empress, as this is the only means by which the outbreak of the revolution can be avoided, in the opinion of the officials.

Reports of the organization of a revolutionary party become more definite daily, and it is not surprising that the agents of the rebellion are at work in almost every quarter of the empire. The nest of the trouble is in the south, however, and it is an outlook that the first trouble will be in that section.

JOHN DEVER HELD FOR SAFE BLOWING

 San Francisco, Aug. 1.—Believing that they have one of the men who blew open the safe in the jewelry store of Thomas Lundy at Fourth and Market streets April 19 and stole \$50,000 worth of diamonds, the police are holding John Dever, known to the police in every city in the United States as an expert cracksmen.

Dever has been identified by John Caulfield, a grocer of the Mission district, as the man who entered his store Monday night and robbed him of \$47 after beating him over the head with a revolver. He has not been charged with this crime, however, and his name is registered only in the "small book" at the police station.

Dever robbed the Caulfield store just at closing time. The proprietor refused to throw up his hands when ordered to do so by the robber and followed in which Caulfield was knocked senseless by Dever's heavy revolver.

Dever was captured the next day on the waterfront, where his clothes had attracted the attention of detectives.

Captain Kelley of the detective force refuses to discuss the case but it is stated that detectives who have been at work on the famous Lundy robbery believe Dever to be one of the men implicated. It is said today that the man will be charged with the Lundy robbery next Monday. He has been sweated by Captain Kelley for three days but maintains a sullen silence.

Thomas Lundy has identified the man as one of several whom he saw hanging about his place before the robbery.

The Lundy robbery was one of the most sensational crimes in the west. The store stands on Market street half a block away from the newspaper offices and three blocks away from the police station. It is only a feet deep and the entire front is glass. The safe, which stands near the center of the store, was blown and the diamonds stolen some time after midnight, but the crime was not discovered until the store was opened in the morning.

RAID ON PARIS LABOR LEADERS

Men Charged With Responsibility for Troubles Are Prisoners.

 Paris, Aug. 1.—The gendarmes today raided the headquarters of the general labor federation and arrested Editor Pougnot of the Voix du Peuple, the revolutionary organ of the federation; Secretary Griffuelhes of the federation, and M. Marie, a prominent member of the labor organization. They are charged with responsibility for the riots at Lyons and for the strikes which are threatening Paris.

The raid was intensely dramatic. Captain Lepin, at the head of a large force of gendarmes and firemen, made a sudden approach upon the headquarters. The building was surrounded in order to prevent anyone from escaping and the place literally was captured by force of arms. The excitement of the same suggested to the onlooker the time of the revolution.

A large number of the strikers engaged in the fighting at Lyons were being held for in the building and their wits and brains added to the confusion caused by the raid.

The authorities believe the three men under arrest were the chief instigators of the outbreaks and an attempt will be made to prove them responsible for many of the recent riots.

Warrants have been issued for several other leaders of the federation movement. It is believed an effort will be made to terminate the existence of the federation.

"Your honor, I move we adjourn."

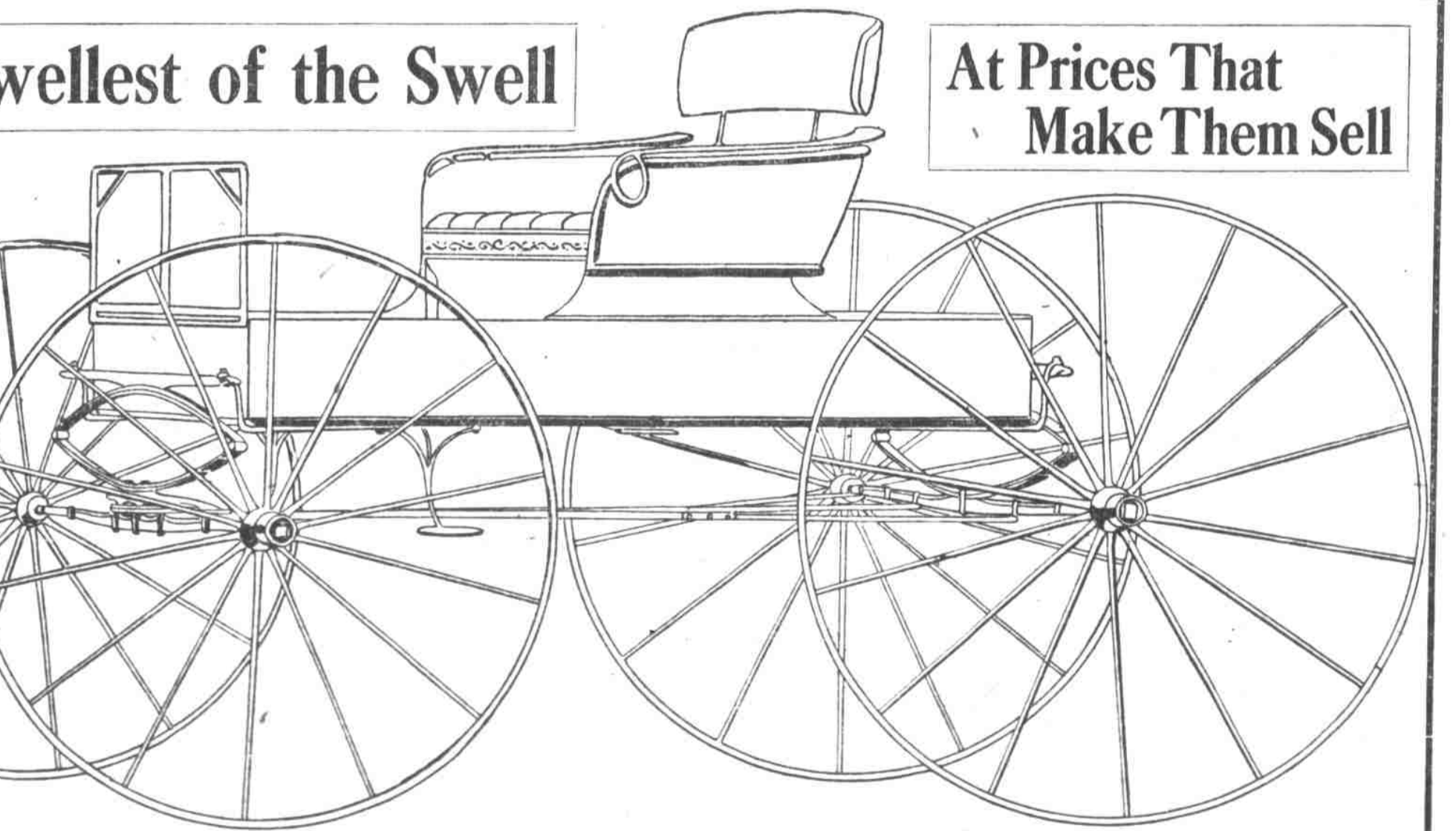
When asked whether he preferred to serve time at Folsom or San Quentin, the prisoner said:
