WEATHER REPORT

During the last 12 hours there has been a decided rise in pressure over Oregon and Washington and a corresponding fall in Idaho and Montana. No rain has fallen in the north Pacific states and it is much cooler in Oregon, Washington and northwestern Montana. The hot weather continues unabated in the interior of northern California and in southern Idaho.

The indications are for fair weather in this district Sunday. It will be much cooler in southern Idaho and slightly warmer in western Oregon and western Washington, except near the coast, where the temperature will remain nearly stationary.
