JUDGE WILLIAMS KNOCKED DOWN

Struck on the head by a piece of scaffolding swung from the Pantheons theatre at Fourth and Stark streets this morning, ex-Mayor George H. Williams, "Oregon's Grand Old Man," was knocked unconscious and lay stunned on the sidewalk until picked up by passers-by. He was assisted across the street to his office in the Chamber of Commerce where it was stated at noon today that

he had not been seriously hurt, although still somewhat dazed by the accident. Judge Williams, who is 67 years old, was walking from his office at 10:30 o'clock this morning. He passed the corner of Fourth and Stark streets where workmen are engaged in making alterations in the Pantheons theatre. Painters who have been at work on the building had swung a scaffolding over the sidewalk and Judge Williams, not noticing it, fell to the sidewalk unconscious, but several men standing near ran to his assistance and helped him to rise from the ground. One of them, recognizing the aged statesman, helped him still dazed and badly shaken up because of his fall, over to the Chamber of Commerce.

Later on Judge Williams was able to answer the telephone messages he received, and only had a slight cut on the head as a result of the blow. He would not say whether he considered the workmen at fault in swinging the scaffolding where they did. Judge Williams age his friends were greatly troubled over the accident. He is one of the most prominent men in the northwest, former attorney-general of the United States, and has held many other positions of great importance and honor.

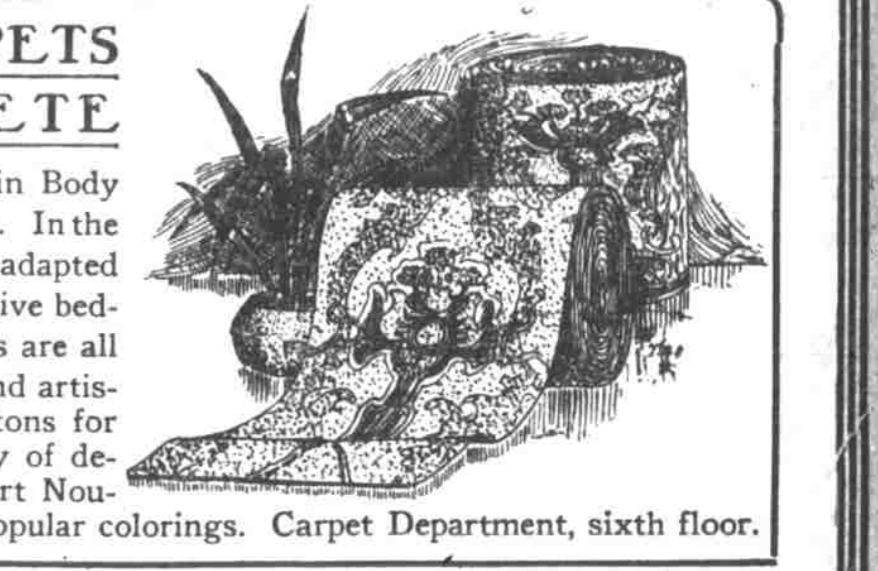

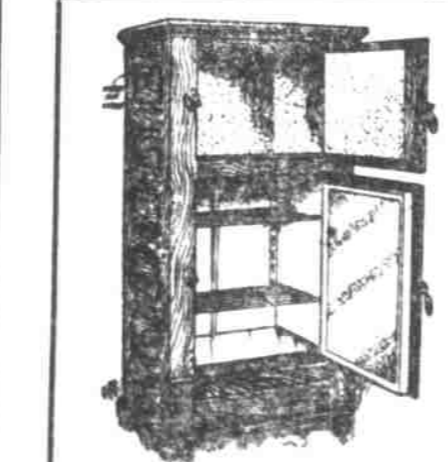

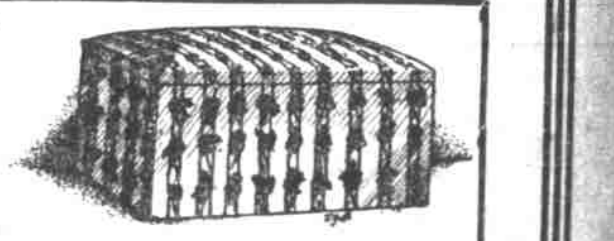
