THREE HIT BY FALLING WALL

Sequel to Grain Elevator Fire at Chicago That Cost \$1,500,000.

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Chicago, Aug. 4.—The fireboat Illinois was sunk and three men probably fatally hurt today by the collapse of a wall of one of the big elevators destroyed in the \$1,500,000 fire which started yesterday in the Burlington route transfer house.

They saw their danger in advance, as the wall wavered, and all jumped into the river and swam for their lives. Three were struck by parts of the falling wall and were dragged ashore in serious condition by their comrades.
