SMALL TRACTS FOR FARMERS TO REGAIN LAND

Realty Board to Purchase Acreage Then Subdivide It.

Adopting the suggestion recently made by Whitney L. Holsie, the Portland Realty Board voted at last night's meeting to purchase a large tract of farm land near Portland, which is to be cut into five, 10 and 20-acre tracts, put into a high state of cultivation and sold to easterners who come to Oregon to settle.

The plan as outlined by Mr. Holsie provides that the land shall be set in fruits and berries, and a portion of it made available for market gardens, dairies, etc., and that it shall be put in such condition that prospective settlers may be provided with a paying horticultural or agricultural proposition from the start.

On motion of Charles E. Fields, seconded by J. O. Rountree and others, W. L. Holsie, because of his intelligent interest in the affairs of the Realty Board, was last night elected a life member of that organization.

A corporation will be formed to handle the farm project, having a capital stock of \$10,000. The stock will be divided into 100 shares and will be taken by members of the Realty Board.

The selection of the first tract of land to be purchased under the Holsie plan was left to a committee, and the board decided after the company is organized and in working order the subdivisions shall be offered for sale and the charters laid over the heads of the tract to be raised shall be along lines recommended by Dr. Whitney Combe of the Oregon Agricultural college experimental station.

COMPLETE PLANS TO WELCOME ATHLETES

The committee in charge of the reception to the Oregon athletes who won distinction at the International Olympic games in London, will meet tomorrow night at 8 o'clock at the Commercial club rooms. A report will be heard from the finance committee which has been meeting with good success in raising a fund for entertaining the triumphant sons. Among the features of the entertainment as planned will be a banquet, a public reception at Multnomah grounds, a parade, and if the funds warrant, a souvenir for their state.

Oregon is the only state which is to welcome three victors in the contests, and hence her reception will be on a large scale. The victors will be in New York the last of this month and are expected to arrive home early in September.

The finance committee consists of W. J. Petrain, Chester Murphy, E. E. Morgan, W. G. Hale, Edgar Frank, F. J. Longman, M. T. Dunne, P. E. Brigham, H. S. Farrell, H. E. Judge and R. A. Cronin.

TOOK 4 YEARS TO REGAIN LAND

William L. Starr was officially notified yesterday afternoon through a decree filed by Judge Wolverson in the United States court, that he has title to Portland property worth \$40,000 which has been under litigation for some 14 years. The case was decided by the court sometime ago, at which time a full account of the contention was printed in The Journal, but it was not until yesterday that the decree was filed by Judge Wolverson, the delay being caused by differences between the parties concerning the construction of the document.

The case grew out of a mortgage given by Van B. Lashmutt, formerly a well-known Portland banker, to the German Savings & Loan society as security for money advanced on a note. It afterwards developed that Starr had prior title to a portion of the land mortgaged by De Lashmutt.

Suit was filed by Starr to recover title to his property, and in the meantime the case has just been concluded. In the meantime the portion of property acquired by Starr has risen in value and is supposed to be worth \$40,000. At the time De Lashmutt gave the mortgage he included the Starr property with several other pieces as security for a loan of \$25,000.

O. L. Babcock, Fred Klatske and a number of others who watched the attack say that not only did the consular secretary drag the Chinese by the collar and beat them over the head with his cane, but as a last resort put his hand to his hip pocket as if to draw a gun. This was done after one of the Chinese had concluded to defend himself.

Some of the Chinese sailors are in the county jail, placed there by the United States marshal on the charge of mutiny. There are 22 remaining on the steamer, but these will only stay in the lock until this afternoon because they demand being paid wages now long overdue. Four o'clock is the time set for a settlement and the Chinese say they will rather go to jail than work another hour for nothing.

CLAIM DIFFERENCE IN EXCHANGE

"We are not trying to run away," he went on to explain as best he could, "what we want is our money. Most of us have been here before and if we wanted to run away we could have done so before. The captain claims he can treat us as he likes because if we don't accept his terms he puts us in jail, saying we try to run away."

Captain Schonwandt declares that the misunderstanding is all due to the fact that Chinese money has depreciated in exchange and that the Chinese can not be made to understand that one country's money is not worth as much as another's at all times. The difference in exchange is said to be quite material at present and in such a way as to deduct the amounts due quite considerably. The Chinese on the other hand believe they are being charged unreasonable commission for getting paid off.

CLAIM DIFFERENCE IN EXCHANGE

Other officers of the steamer also declare that the question of exchange is what caused the trouble but again declare that so far the matter has been very faithful and had never showed inclination to desert. They consider the action of the consul and the Secretary of the Consul entirely uncalled for.

Brave with Police Close By.
"That fellow came down here yesterday," said one of the officers and acted as if he was not at all surprised to be consulted but as if he owned the whole German empire. "We do not propose to let the crew out in such a manner because in the first place it is still human and in the second place it might be dangerous to go to sea with them. There is no telling but that they believe us in sympathy with the assailant and they might seek revenge."

RELATIVE TO HOGS RUNNING AT LARGE

A subscriber wants to know whether there is a hog law in Columbia county, and whether a person can let his hogs run at large and destroy his neighbors' crops if the latter does not have a hog fence. Section 4215, Beilinger and Cotton's code provides that any person who allows a hog to run at large may be fined not less than \$5 nor more than \$50. Complaint should be made before a justice of the peace. Section 4215 provides that upon the petition of 100 or more legal voters of any county, or 15 or more legal voters in any precinct, filed with the county clerk, a vote will be ordered at any general election for or against stock running at large. Whether such a vote has been taken in Columbia county can be ascertained from the county clerk.
