KEATS IS TRYING BREAK RECORD

Pope-Hartford Car Endeavoring to Set New Time to Mt. Hood. In an effort to lower the automobile time from Portland to Government camp, at the base of Mount Hood, and return, from two days to eight hours, Harry L. Keats of the Keats Auto Company and a party of friends are racing over the intervening stretch today in a Pope-Hartford car.

The party left the Keats garage promptly at 7 o'clock this morning and expects to be back at the starting point at 3 o'clock this afternoon. Mr. Keats stated before starting the car that he would make no foolhardy attempt to lower records at the risk of injuring the car.

The hardest part of the journey is expected between Tollake and Summit. Here the machine will be forced to climb a steep, sandy hill nine miles in length, with many sharp curves. In order to make the equipment of the car standard it is bearing five passengers, including Mr. Keats, the main member of the party, Dr. W. N. Jones of the timber firm of Jones & Krebs, and son, R. Jones, W. D. Wallace and H. A. Wallace.

SHAKES HANDS; PULLS TRIGGER

Lawrence H. Belser Commits Suicide With Rifle at Medford, Or. (United Press Leased Wire.) Medford, Or., Aug. 5.—Lawrence H. Belser, a well-to-do real estate dealer of Wenatchee, Wash., about 50 years of age, committed suicide last night by blowing the top of his head off with a rifle in his room at the Nash hotel. He contracted a week ago to purchase an orchard. Just before the tragedy he went for several acquaintances, shook hands with them, and then stepping to an adjacent room he pulled the trigger before they realized his intention he had fired the fatal shot. In their presence he was advised to purchase the orchard, but he was not to be deterred. He was rational up to the moment of his crime.

SALOON BANDIT IS SHOT BY BARTENDER

Grand Point, Idaho, Aug. 5.—A lone saloon, while attempting to hold up the Hireson bar, was killed by the day bartender, Big George Fitzsimmons, a 250-lb. just right. The robber had been hanging around the place all evening playing cards and soon as all but four men had left, he pulled out two guns and commanded them to stick up their hands or he would shoot their heads off.
