JACKSON REID CASE IS PECULIARLY PUZZLING

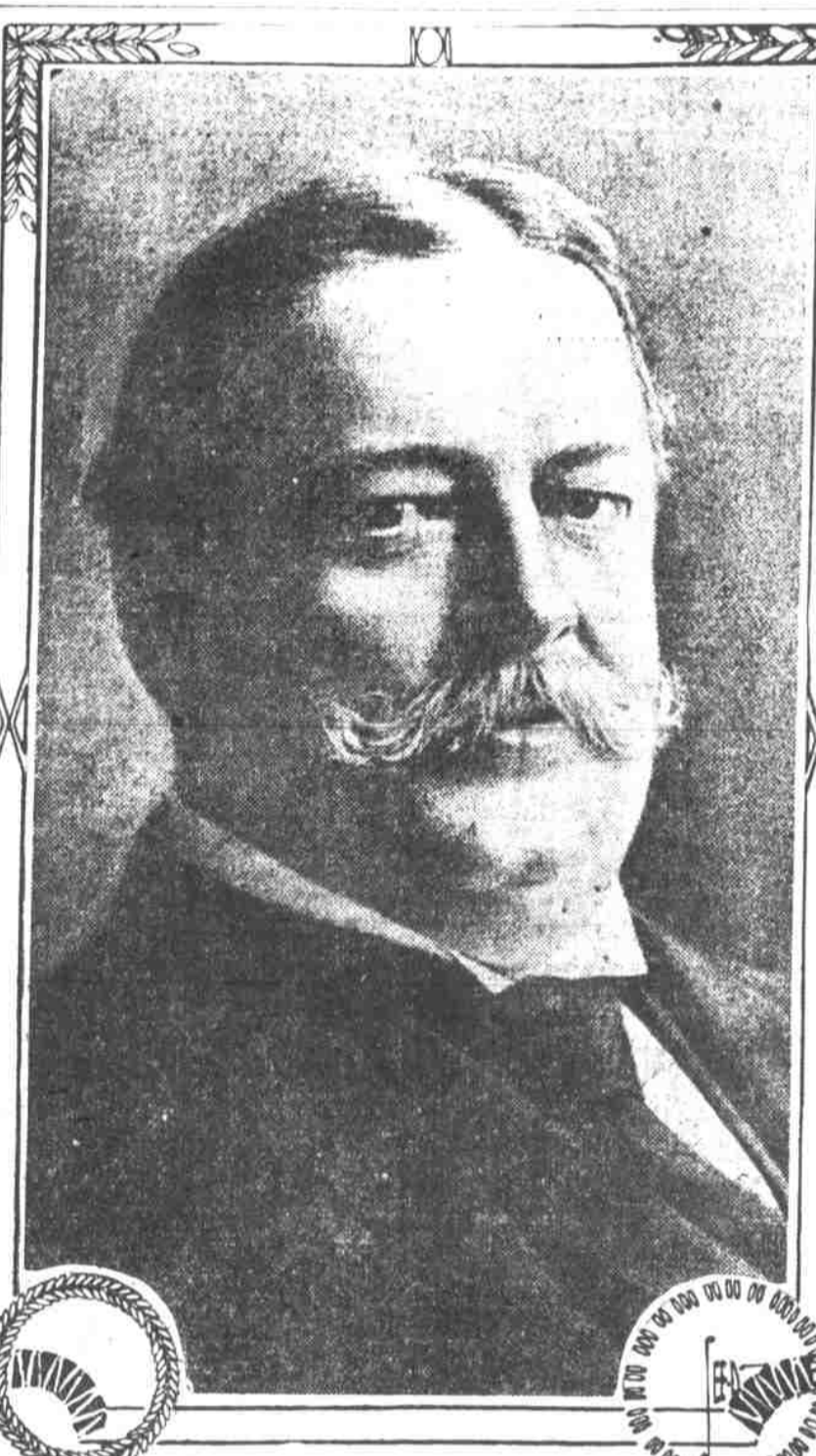
COOKE BACK TO NEW YORK FOR TRIAL
