

WHEAT OUTLOOK UMATILLA

Average Yield Will Run Close to 25 Bushels to the Acre—Lack of Moisture Responsible for Decrease Under Last Year.

Because of the general feeling of unrest regarding Oregon's wheat crop this year, The Journal has detailed Hyman H. Cohen to make an exhaustive investigation into crop conditions. His articles will deal with probable wheat yields in the different sections of the state, and the causes which have combined to effect increases or decreases in production.

Athena, Or., Aug. 6.—With fall sown wheat on the reservation going as high as 35 bushels to the acre and an average yield somewhere around 25 bushels, there is no cause to complain of this year's wheat crop in this part of Umatilla county.

While the crop will not reach the production of a year ago, the yield is so much better than expected a few weeks ago that there is general rejoicing among the producers as well as the merchants.

Money for Growers.

With wheat going at an average of 25 bushels to the acre and the price going as far toward the dollar mark as competition can put it, there will be more money in wheat-growing here than ever.

Umatilla's No. 1 Wheat.

This condition does not affect the quality of the grain, for lately received samples at warehouses show the wheat to range between 57 and 60 pounds to the bushel—not a few toppling the scales at the latter figure. This will put most of Umatilla's wheat in the No. 1 grade, and this section will be one of the few in the state to produce this quality of grain.

Harvest is now on in full swing and as the cut progresses the returns grow better.

passing through a hostile country. A practice march of some seven or eight miles was made by each regiment. In the Third Oregon the vanguard and skirmishing parties were under the command of Major May. A larger force under Major Baker constituted the support of the vanguard. The rest of the command was under the direction of Major Dunbar. Major Hammond of the Fourth commanded one brigade, and the other was led by Captain Thornton. Just before the departure for this maneuver the officers of the Third listened to a lecture on the subject of Camp Stanley, given by the adjutant of the Third Infantry, United States army. His instruction was very specific, and his suggestions were carried out to the letter on the field.

Several other lectures were delivered during the day, and the most prominent among which was the address by Colonel Davis of the subsistence department. Colonel Davis is responsible for the high efficiency of the camp bakery, and the subject of his talk was "Subsistence for Men in Camp and Barracks."

Late in the afternoon the officers of the Third Oregon made a formal call upon General Brush at brigade headquarters. With the exception of the two officers engaged in guard mounting, every officer of the Third was present.

Lieutenant's Close Call.

One of the many humorous incidents of camp life occurred yesterday morning when Lieutenant White, adjutant of the First battalion, Fourth regiment, received for the first time his punishment. It happened that a horse was secured from a Portland riding academy, where he had been used as a hurdle horse, and his education had been given with the use of a bugle. When the lieutenant first mounted the horse appeared as docile as a truck horse, but a moment later a bugle sounded, and taking that for a signal he attempted to hurdle the first obstacle in sight. It chanced to be one of the headquarters tents, and in a moment the animal as well as his rider was bodily entangled in the tent ropes. From this he went to another, and finally bolted down the company street and across toward the parade ground. Here the battle was fought out between horse and rider, and a few minutes later they returned for duty with the rider in command.

DOINGS OF THE OREGON MEN AT CAMP STANLEY

Camp David S. Stanley, American Lake, Wash., Aug. 5.—The Oregon guard has settled down to the routine of camp life and drill. The two regiments are camped near Murray station, both regiments being at the southern extremity of the camp.

The encampment this year is being carried on a larger scale than ever before. Encamped at the lake are the Third and Fourth Oregon, First, Second, Third and Sixth Washington and the Fourth artillery, U. S. A.

Encampment Well Handled.

So carefully planned was the encampment that there was not the slightest confusion upon the arrival of the troops. Upon arrival each was assigned to their position, the location of each having been blocked out before their arrival.

The feeding, clothing and sheltering of the army, now encamped is carried on with perfection. The regular government ration given the men and the bread is furnished by government cooks.

Each regiment of militia is supplied with regular army officers who direct and inspect the maneuvers. Though the encampment is being held primarily for the benefit of the militia, the regular troops are daily given drill and hard work.

Veteran Washington Guard.

Quartered at the lake are the three oldest regiments in Uncle Sam's service, the First, Second and Third infantry, which was organized during the revolutionary war. These three regiments are so closely connected that it is only by examining the government records that their individual history can be traced.

By a peculiar coincidence they are encamped near each other. Although not implied in the name, the Third infantry is the oldest, it being created by an act of congress of September 21, 1789. The benefits of the militia law were first given to the militia of the Mexican and Civil wars, and in all instances with special privilege.

The officers and members have on different occasions been especially

awarded for marked gallantry on the field.

ROUMANIAN ARMY GETS A SHAKEUP

Its Officers Vicious Grafters and Its Rank and File a Rabble.

Vienna, Aug. 5.—Military circles are startled today by the results of an investigation following a report from Major Sturdza, the premier's son, charging shocking immorality, drunkenness, reckless extravagance and gambling among the officers of the Roumanian army and utter inefficiency throughout the rank and file. When the young major made these astounding disclosures some time ago the ministry immediately ordered a general inspection and the findings of the commission delegated to investigate amply bear out the charges.

Discipline in the army appears to be entirely lacking. There are practically no regular drills and the accounts of the commissariat reveal extensive frauds, the officers in command having filled their pockets with public funds. As a consequence of his remarkable disclosures Major Sturdza has been called upon by a score of prominent army officers to fight duels. He has vanquished seven of his antagonists.
