"Get-Rich-Quick Wallingsford"—by George Randolph Chester. "A business buccannery" says one who called J. Rufus Wallingsford, while another has said, "He was an exponent, though perhaps exaggerated, after using American spirit of commercial gain." A financial buccannery he certainly was, but it would be a sad commentary on the American spirit of commercial gain to liken it, as a whole, to Wallingsford. His type does exist, and has ever since Jacob defeated Esau out of his blessing and later schemed to make the cattle of Laban striped or speckled to suit his commercial interests. It is not therefore any more the American spirit than the oriental spirit; it is simply the spirit of human nature to get something for nothing. But Wallingsford's particular type was not of the bargain counter class, he soared into realms of high finance and guided his craft with quick wit, resourcefulness and an unlimited amount of assurance.

His first transaction, which the book relates, is characteristic of his career, as well as of the other incidents in the story. He goes into a town with less than \$200 in the world; he drives to the best hotel in the best carriage to get a room and a breakfast, and orders a bookkeeper who has saved out of his meager salary \$5,000, but who is too smart to let go of it to a sharper. From one to the other, among many classes of people he goes, receiving the same indifference, and each one he asks is more interested in what some one else is saying or doing than in what the "Voice of the Big City" is saying, till at length he comes back to Aurelia and, at the close of the day, sitting with her hand clasped in his, she answers his question without knowing it.

This is a fair sample of each of the little sketches that follow—all delicate of conception, telling a little bit of human life, warmed by a genial sympathy and picked out with points of brilliant wit that flash from the most unexpected recesses.

Mr. Henry is among the most clever of our American writers, with a literary style that, while peculiarly his own, is above criticism.

He never moralizes and yet he never writes without a purpose, and after reading any one of the little sketches in this book, which varies in merit only according to the taste of the reader.
