

# MAKING CITY BEAUTIFUL

### Elevated Boulevard Over the Chicago River—Settlement of Great Fortune—Hearst's Convention Side-lights.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Chicago, Aug. 8.—The first step proposed by the Commercial club of Chicago in a general "city beautiful" scheme, an elevated boulevard over the Chicago river to connect the north and south side boulevards and park systems, has received a black eye. For some "mysterious reason" the boulevard committee of the club advocated a long causeway or viaduct which would cost from \$5,000,000 to \$10,000,000 but the taxpayers who would have to foot the bills rose up wrathfully and declared that the viaduct not only would be but "a rich man's causeway," a "special way for automobiles," a "reward" and defiance instead of an improvement, but that such a grotesque structure would make Chicago's efforts to dress up groggy instead of admirable. Mrs. Potter Palmer, among others, denounced the plan and within a few years she has seen such of European boulevards where beauty has been attained, has seen more of the largest and busiest boulevards in fact. A majority of the members of the committee which proposed the objectionable viaduct were found to live in suburbs of the city and an unfortunate self interest was disclosed by the hostile property owners. The center of the boulevard likely to be constructed, but on the surface where all classes of people would benefit and the largest number will be the completion of a beautiful thoroughfare through the heart of the city, where property owners will be encouraged to erect handsome buildings in the place of the dingy ones of the present. This boulevard will be flanked by trees and the largest number where now is the center of the whole district, will be made on a scale to rival the attractions of Paris. It is now determined to dress up in spite of blunders.

### Settlement of Fortune.

The settlement of the \$25,000,000 trust left by Otto Young of this city, one of the largest which has yet in the United States been tied up in trust, has been complicated by the arrival of a \$2,000,000 grandchild, Samuel K. Martin Jr., who immediately became one of the richest babies in his own right in the world. His arrival, however, not only cost the six other heirs of the Young fortune his portion, a seventh of the estate, but postponed the final settlement of the trust for 21 years. The prospective share of Mrs. Celia Young Higginson was donated by Samuel's appearance from 25 to 22 per cent of the whole, that of Mrs. Catherine O. Young Hobart, by the sum of \$45,000. Under the terms of the trust the division cannot be made until the youngest grandchild has attained 21 years, and the result in this case will be interesting commentaries upon the growing disposition of wealthy parents to trust in estates in much the same manner as Marshall Field did and many men in the east have done. What effect the certainty of great wealth will have upon the morals and health of their heirs and also what effect upon financial affairs the trusteeship of such big sums will have, probably will be made known by the time this \$25,000,000 baby receives his share of the Young fortune, if he does live to receive it.

### Hearst's Convention.

Under X-ray analysis the roster of delegates to the Independence league's first convention, at which William Randolph Hearst uttered the keynote war cry against things in general, bore an interesting resemblance to the payroll of the Hearst publications. It was noticed that there were many vociferous voters among the delegates which reminded one of those which cry "Ehry" on the street corners of many cities. In explanation it was stated that in the Texas delegation T. W. Adams, a newspaper "buster" or circulation "pusher," was an active delegate. "Ch" Red, who drives pay from the Hearst office for the same sort of work, was an important delegate from Maine. Tom Butts, a circulation man from Indiana, was a delegate from that state. "Moss" Annenberg, whose work is securing subscribers to the Hearst papers in Wisconsin, also was a delegate. # PEELS FIGHT TO THE DEATH

### Mowed Down by Machine Guns, Persian Subjects Refuse to Surrender.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Teheran, Aug. 8.—If ever a persevering coterie of revolutionists lived anywhere it is in the important Persian city of Tabriz. The shah's troops have been fighting them for weeks with fire, sword and machine guns, the quarter in which they are concentrated has been reduced to ruins and still the remnant of survivors battles on over the wrecks of their homes and among the bodies of their slaughtered companions. The trouble is the shah made a rather ineffectual choice of a military commander at Tabriz, Ruchin Khan, who hasn't been long out of the robber district, flattered about for a time and were followers of his banner when he was still making a living by predatory methods and they can't get out of the habit of helping themselves to any portable thing they take a fancy to. Every time they have been on the verge of victory nothing Ruchin Khan could do would prevent his men from scattering through the city to look for plunder and while they were taking their pockets it has been the revolutionists' custom to make a sally, regain most of the booty and bring fresh supplies of ammunition and begin the campaign all over again.

# SULTAN'S GRIP IS WEAKENING

### Turks In Almost Open Mutiny Against Their Ruler, Abdul Hamid.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Vienna, Aug. 8.—Fresh signs of the subject races under Turkish rule are reported with every batch of official dispatches from the near east. But that the army's demand for a liberalization of the government will be proof against an offer of settlement of its long-standing arrangements of pay no Austrian student of oriental affairs believes. Domiciliary visits are almost daily occurrences in every locality where there is the least suspicion of hostility to the sultan's rule and large quantities of arms and explosives are reported to have been seized in the past few days. The prisons are filled with suspects and arrests are made by the dozen daily.

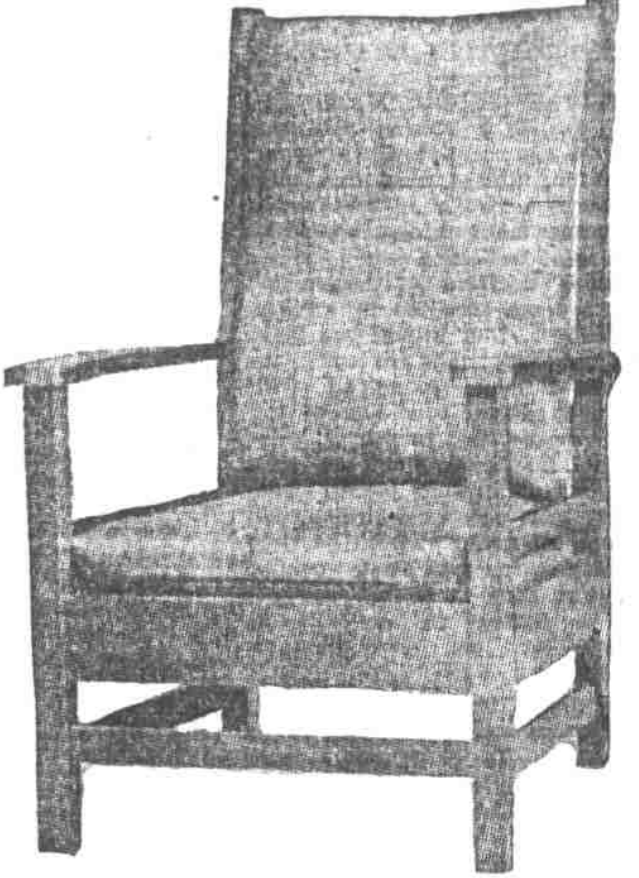
