RANCHERS HARPOON RECORD AUTO TRIALS

There will be no more endurance runs between Portland and Government camp at the base of Mount Hood, if the ranchers along the way can prevent it.

Ever since Harry Keats and party made that record breaking run to the summit of the Cascade mountains have been received by the club from farmers along the road at the rate of two a day. They threaten to have the sheriffs of Clackamas and Multnomah counties arrest the next party that exceeds the speed limit over the road.
