

TROOPS RETURN

Up Valley Regiments Arrive This Morning From American Lake - Encampment Has Given Soldiers Hard Drilling.

BIG SUIT AGAINST UNION PACIFIC LOST

Harriman, George Gould and other Wall street magnates are the indirect victims in a decision handed down today by the United States court of appeals denying the claims of the mortgage bondholders of the Union Pacific railroad. The suit, which involved millions of dollars, had been pending five years.

BRAY, CO. K'S REPORT OF THE THEATRE MERGER

C. E. Bray, personal representative of Martin Beck, the reputed organizer of the new theatrical trust, is in Portland today and confirmed the New York dispatches which said that Klaw & Erlanger and Beck intended corraling all the theatres in the United States into a \$500,000 trust. Matters connected with the organization of this merger have kept Mr. Beck from being in Portland for the opening of his new theatre here.

"There are so many theatres in the country," said Mr. Bray, "that it is hard for any of them to make a living. At present any time a bunch of men decide they want a theatre in a city they subscribe the money, get it together, build, and then begin to look around to find some attractions in it. Then they put Klaw & Erlanger and all the big priced attractions, that the Orpheum people are in with their vaudeville and that they are left out in the cold, with their big house on their hands. If this house only hurt them we wouldn't interfere but we find it forms a constant menace to our houses, so we propose to keep out as many of these people as we can."

Plans All Laid.

"The meeting was scheduled to take place in the offices of Klaw & Erlanger in the New Amsterdam building, New York August 4, and I think the work done up to the present has been more in the line of preparing for the merger than in actually accomplishing it. Every theatrical interest of importance in the country is concerned in the merger, including Klaw & Erlanger, who also represented Charles Frohman, B. Keith of Boston, F. Z. Frocker, S. E. Poll, Percy G. Williams, C. E. Kohl of Chicago, Martin Beck of the Orpheum, also representing Morris McVerdy of San Francisco, Lee Shubert, George B. Cox of Cincinnati, Samuel Nixon, Al Hayman, John H. Davlin of St. Paul, Hayman, F. E. Albee, Samuel Scribner,

Treadwell, former director of the defunct California Safe Deposit & Trust company, who is charged with perjury in connection with testimony given before the grand jury. Assistant District Attorney William Hoff Cook, who is conducting the case for the prosecution, today announced the particular point upon which he will make his plea to have Treadwell sent to state prison. He expects to show that Treadwell disposed of \$35,000 worth of the Colton securities to the American National bank in January, 1907.

HITCHCOCK UMPIRES WEST VIRGINIA FIGHT

(United Press Leased Wire.) Hot Springs, Va., Aug. 12.—Frank H. Hitchcock, Republican campaign manager, arrived here today and after a conference with Taft proceeded immediately to take up the grand jury, stretching out the West Virginia struggle. He probably will leave tonight.

HITCHCOCK AND VORYS IN COUNCIL

(United Press Leased Wire.) Hot Springs, Va., Aug. 12.—For the first time since Taft was nominated at Chicago, Frank H. Hitchcock, the national campaign manager, and Arthur I. Vorys of Ohio, whom Hitchcock displaced as the chief of the Taft forces,

Will Better Conditions.

"As I understand it the object of the proposed merger is to have a general betterment of theatrical conditions and harmonious conditions and harmonious cooperation between the various theatrical interests. It is the first time that both the moral and legitimate and the devilish interests have got together in this way, and it's what might be called an offensive and defensive alliance. We want to get out of this unnecessary features to the business."

In no other line is it as easy for some one to get started as in the theatrical. It seems as if everybody with a few thousand dollars wants to start a theatrical enterprise. You might say this doesn't hurt us, but it does. Every thing that goes our way helps us, no matter how small it is, and everything that goes against us hurts us. And we want everything to move our way, of course. But as yet the merger, I understand, is merely in the formative stages. Mr. Beck is so hard at work on it that he was unable to come up to the northwest to be present at the opening of the Orpheum houses at Portland, Seattle, Butte and Spokane."

Oversees Orpheum Opening.

Mr. Beck is in Portland seeing that everything is ready for the opening of the new Orpheum theatre here. He is one of the biggest men in the theatrical world. He is a big, big man, mentally and much of the direction of the Orpheum circuit falls to his lot. He and Mr. Beck are at the Portland hotel and have tonight for the north.

Strange Case in New York Which Ended Fatally for Mrs. Trumbull.

New York, Aug. 12.—An agonizing death from rabies caused by the bite of a pet cat came to light in this city recently in Hempstead, L. I., when Coroner George T. Tatum of Nassau county, recorded a permit for the cremation of the body of Mrs. Jane Trumbull. Mrs. Trumbull lived in the village of Baldwin, and about a month ago, while alone and fondling a cat which she had owned for many years, she was seized at her throat, missed it, and for a part of a second clung to the woman with its teeth buried in her neck. Mrs. Trumbull had torn the animal away from her. It raced through the cottage, saving and snarling. The woman drove the animal outdoors finally, and when her husband returned that evening told him what had happened. He called a neighbor and the cat was mad, but did not tell Mrs. Trumbull for fear of alarming her. Mrs. Trumbull ran about for several days later and killed it in its tracks.

Woman in Convulsions.

No symptoms of danger from the cat's bite developed until two weeks later when Mrs. Trumbull, who had been nervous and prostrated, Dr. E. W. Fletcher of Freeport, who had been treating her for a long time, assumed, it was said yesterday, that this was responsible for her collapse. She grew weaker daily.

Just at dawn on Sunday last Mrs. Trumbull, who had been sleeping only fitfully, aroused her husband with a scream and a loud wailing cry. He found her bedside he found great beads of sweat standing on her forehead and cheeks.

"Oh, it was terrible," moaned the woman. "It must have been a nightmare. I thought the cat was on my face and tearing it with all its claws. I fought hard to get up and it scratched and bit all the more fiercely. I put my hands up to my face and the cat bit me on the forehead and neck. Are they bleeding?" Mrs. Trumbull held out her hands for her husband to examine.

"It was only a bad dream," said Mr. Trumbull, and after quieting his wife as best he could he telephoned for Dr. Fletcher.

When the physician arrived he was compelled to administer an opiate. Afterward the woman said she felt easier, yet she complained very much of sharp pains in her limbs. She slept only a few minutes Sunday night, and this morning Monday found her in convulsions.

Trumbull summoned neighbors to attend his wife, pending the arrival of Dr. Fletcher. For some time the time the physician got there Mrs. Trumbull was foaming at the mouth, grinding her teeth and, it is said, every little while uttering a note like an angry cat.

She was a big woman, weighing nearly 150 pounds, and despite the combined strength of three men who sought to hold her she had thrown herself out of bed and on the floor.

Begs Them to Kill Her. Hypodermic injections were administered to Mrs. Trumbull, with the idea of stopping her convulsions, but Dr. Fletcher said as well have given her so much water. As the convulsions went on they became more violent and the woman broke the grip of the men holding her and smashed a bureau. In the succeeding paroxysms she threw her bed, her chair and a table. She broke two chairs as she beat around on the floor.

This horrible agony went on for eight hours before death ended it. During seven hours of that time Mrs. Trumbull was conscious and between convulsions begged her physician to kill her. Her neighbors to kill her or do something to prevent her suffering.
