FIVE BALLOONS WILL RACE FOR FORBES CUP

(United Press Leased Wire.) North Adams, Mass., Aug. 13.—The balloon race for the Forbes trophy will start from this place tomorrow and if the weather conditions are favorable the contest probably will be one of the most notable of its kind that has ever taken place in America.

According to the conditions governing the contest each pilot is required to select the town outside of a 20-mile radius from North Adams where he will land. To win the cup he must land within 10 miles of the postoffice of the town or, if two more balloons land within this distance, the winner will be the one who lands nearest.

Largest Crowd Ever at Boston Game Honors the "Grand Old Man." Born in Ohio 42 years ago. First professional engagement, Canton, Tri-State League, 1890. Continuous major league service, 18 years.

Remained with the Cleveland team from 1890 to 1898. With St. Louis (National) from 1898 to 1900. With Boston (American) 1901 to 1908. August 5, 1901—Shut out Philadelphia Athletics without a hit, not a man reaching first base.

June 24, 1892—For Cleveland, held St. Louis Browns to 16-inning tie, 3 to 3, at St. Louis, allowing five hits. July 4, 1895—Lost to Athletics, 4 to 2, in 20-inning contest against Wadsworth.

June 30, 1908—Pitched no-hit game against New York, no New York player reaching second base, and made three hits.
