Close Successful Convention After Initiation of Large Class.

While yesterday's events close the real work of the convention, the members still have a treat in store in the moonlight excursion that will be held on the river tomorrow night under the auspices of the Shepherds of America, second degree Foresters. Two steamers and a dancing barge have been chartered and will leave the Stark street dock at 8 o'clock. This will be the final entertainment of the week. Officers of the grand court of Oregon were given a genuine surprise yesterday when they were called to one side by the visiting grand court officers from Washington and each presented with a handsome gold watch bearing the seal of the Foresters. The gifts came as a great surprise to the Oregon members who have been entertaining their Washington brothers throughout the week. Mr. and Mrs. O'Grady left this morning with their children for the sound cities. They were accompanied by John Edmond, grand treasurer of Oregon, and the following Washington officers: Dr. Harold Harrison, grand chief ranger, Tacoma; Charles Barth, grand sub-chief ranger, Spokane; Thomas H. Andrews,

grand secretary, Seattle; C. T. Meacher, grand treasurer, Everett; S. K. Bowen, deputy supreme chief ranger, Aberdeen; H. Conklin, chairman of the grand trustees, Tacoma; W. L. Norrington, supreme trustee, Seattle. Grand Secretary T. H. Andrews will meet the party at Spokane, August 20, and complete the trip through Washington and Idaho, introducing the supreme chief ranger to the grand court officers of Idaho. **NIP, NIP, OORAY FOR THE WEARY CITY MAN** City employees will be allowed vacations of 15 days this year and all years hereafter. This was decided at yesterday's meeting of the council. Hereafter the employees, with the exception of the police and firemen, were allowed but 12 days. The council also voted to allow the city executive board to make temporary appointments while the employees are on their vacations.

LAST ACCOUNT FILED IN 1888

Heir to Calef Estate Demands Accounting After 20 Years. Mrs. Almira Calef Wood has appealed to the county court to compel Edward Quackenbush to make an accounting as to her separate estate and the balance of her brother, Allen Calef, derived from the estate of their father, Charles E. Calef. She alleges that Quackenbush has failed to account for his stewardship as the only surviving executor of the will for 20 years, he having filed his last report in 1888. Judge Webster issued an order requiring Quackenbush to come into court within 30 days with a detailed statement of the money and property received and expended to file vouchers and to refer to orders of the court authorizing such expenditures as he may have made. No orders have been made by the court in the last 20 years. The report made by Quackenbush in 1888 showed that there was then \$2,179 on hand belonging to Allen Calef and \$1,143 belonging to Almira Calef. She has since become the wife of James McL. Wood. Under the terms of the will the property was converted into cash and the part belonging to the children was to be reinvested by the executors in mortgages and stocks for the benefit of the children, to be held until the son reached the age of 18 and the daughter the age of 15. The will was made in 1876 at The Dalles, Charles E. Calef having died there the same year. Originally there were four executors. One declined to serve and the others dropped out until, in 1885, only Quackenbush was left. Previous to that time five reports were made to the court, but the one filed in 1888 is the only one since, and Mrs. Wood now insists that she shall be informed as to just what has been done during the last 20 years.
