RAILROADS HELD FOR FOREST FIRES

State Warden of Washington Makes Complaint to Railway Commission—Asks Investigation.

Olympia, Wash., Aug. 14.—A complaint to the railway commission by the state fire warden that railroad locomotives have been responsible for many of the forest fires this year, and requesting that investigation be made will likely be referred back to the warden with a request for more specific information.

A. W. Perley, state track and equipment inspector, reports to the commission that such an investigation is too big a task for one man. It requires about two hours to get an inspection of the spark arresting device on a railway locomotive, and the Northern Pacific alone has 150 engines running out of Tacoma.

EFFORT TO KNOCK OUT CALIFORNIA DOPE LAW

San Francisco, Aug. 14.—Alleging that curious points in the California pure drug and anti-opium laws make them unconstitutional, a group of lawyers, headed by J. L. Halliwell, a druggist of that city, has applied to the supreme court for a writ of habeas corpus to release his clients from technical arrest incurred by the alleged violation of the law by selling laudanum containing more than two grains of opium to the public.

SHERIFF CAN'T HAVE THAT \$500 REWARD

Attorney-General Decides Officer Is Only Doing Duty When He Captures Man With Price.

Olympia, Wash., Aug. 14.—That a public officer cannot accept a reward for the performance of any act or service which it is his duty to perform is the ruling of the attorney-general of the state presented by Sheriff Andrew Williams for the \$500 reward offered by Governor Mead for the arrest and conviction of the murderers of Ada Horer. The murder was committed in Whatcom county January 19, 1907, and through the efforts of Sheriff Williams the murderers were captured and sent to the penitentiary for life.
