

CHAINED WIFE TO ATTIC WALL

Cowardly Cruelty of Count Margalho Revealed by Police Investigation

(United Press Leased Wire) Lisbon, Aug. 14.—A cruel story was revealed today when the facts leading to the recent banishment of Count Margalho, a lord of the old Portuguese nobility, from King Manuel's court, were made public. For centuries his family had ruled the kingdom and his treatment of his wife was usually and justly feared. The little one-eyed king, the count was brought before the king and deprived of the right of office and banished from the country in disgrace.

Married Banker's Daughter.

The count married the daughter of a rich Lisbon banker from three years ago and for a time lived happily with her. Two years later both his wife and child disappeared and to questions concerning their whereabouts Margalho never gave a satisfactory answer.

A police investigation was finally ordered and detectives visited the count's residence a few nights ago. Breaking a tightly sealed door leading into an attic chamber they found the countess chained to the wall, her features distorted by suffering, her hair white and her form reduced almost to a skeleton.

The child, in a worse condition than its mother, lay on a pile of straw in a corner, half dead from hunger and neglect. So impaired had the mind of the countess become by her fearful suffering that she could not give an accurate account of her imprisonment. The servants confessed that neither and child had been held in the attic during the entire year, fed only on bread and water.

Weak Defense.

In defense of his action the count asserted that he believed his wife had accepted attentions from a naval officer whose name he refused to give. He admitted that he had nothing more than suspicions on which to base his accusation. Why he had punished his wife as well as the mother for the latter's alleged infidelity he could not explain.

King Manuel and Queen Amelie were to visit the count's estate upon the expiration of the period of court mourning for the death of the late king, but when they heard the awful story of the countess' imprisonment, they immediately canceled the engagement and ordered Margalho never to appear in their presence again.

NEW OUTLET FOR WALDPORT

Oregon Coast Resort Can Now Be Reached by Two Wagon Roads.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal) Waldport, Or., Aug. 14.—Work on the Waldport wagon road is progressing rapidly. The right of way on the south side of the Astoria river has been cleared nearly to town, work as far as Chual Creek. A party will be organized at that point.

James Kent of Waldport has a crew working on the north side and the road will soon be completed as far as Hildesheim. This will give Waldport another outlet to the valley and will aid materially in making the city one of the most popular summer resorts on the Pacific coast.

A governmental survey is being made from the mouth of Chual Creek to Sturgeon for the purpose of constructing a trail between those points.

GROUSE RUSH WILL BE ON SATURDAY

(Special Dispatch to The Journal) Pendleton, Or., Aug. 14.—When the grouse season opens in eastern Oregon next Saturday, August 15, there promises to be the greatest rush for the mountains witnessed for a number of years. The protection which the forest rangers have given the grouse and other mountain birds by preventing fires have greatly increased the supply of birds and the Blue mountains are now literally "alive" with grouse and pheasants. The young birds are now about grown and some excellent sport is promised. Good grouse hunting may be found near Kamela, Meacham, Huron, Wenasha Springs or at any other mountain stopping place.

OBTAINED CREDIT AND SOLD GOODS

Slick Swindler Dressed Well and Fooled Los Angeles Merchants.

(United Press Leased Wire) Los Angeles, Cal., Aug. 14.—Accused of swindling Los Angeles jobbers out of a \$5,000 stock of groceries by wearing a new suit of clothes each day for two weeks, William Davis, known here as William Thatcher, is under arrest at present. Steps were taken today to have him returned to this city for trial.

Davis disappeared from Los Angeles a month ago after he had sold out, at prices below cost, a \$5,000 stock of groceries he secured on credit from local jobbers.

In obtaining credit Davis depended entirely upon his personal appearance. He mingled with the local grocers and each day appeared in a different suit of clothes. When credit men inquired into his financial standing his acquaintances did not hesitate to give him a high rating on the strength of the manner in which he dressed.


