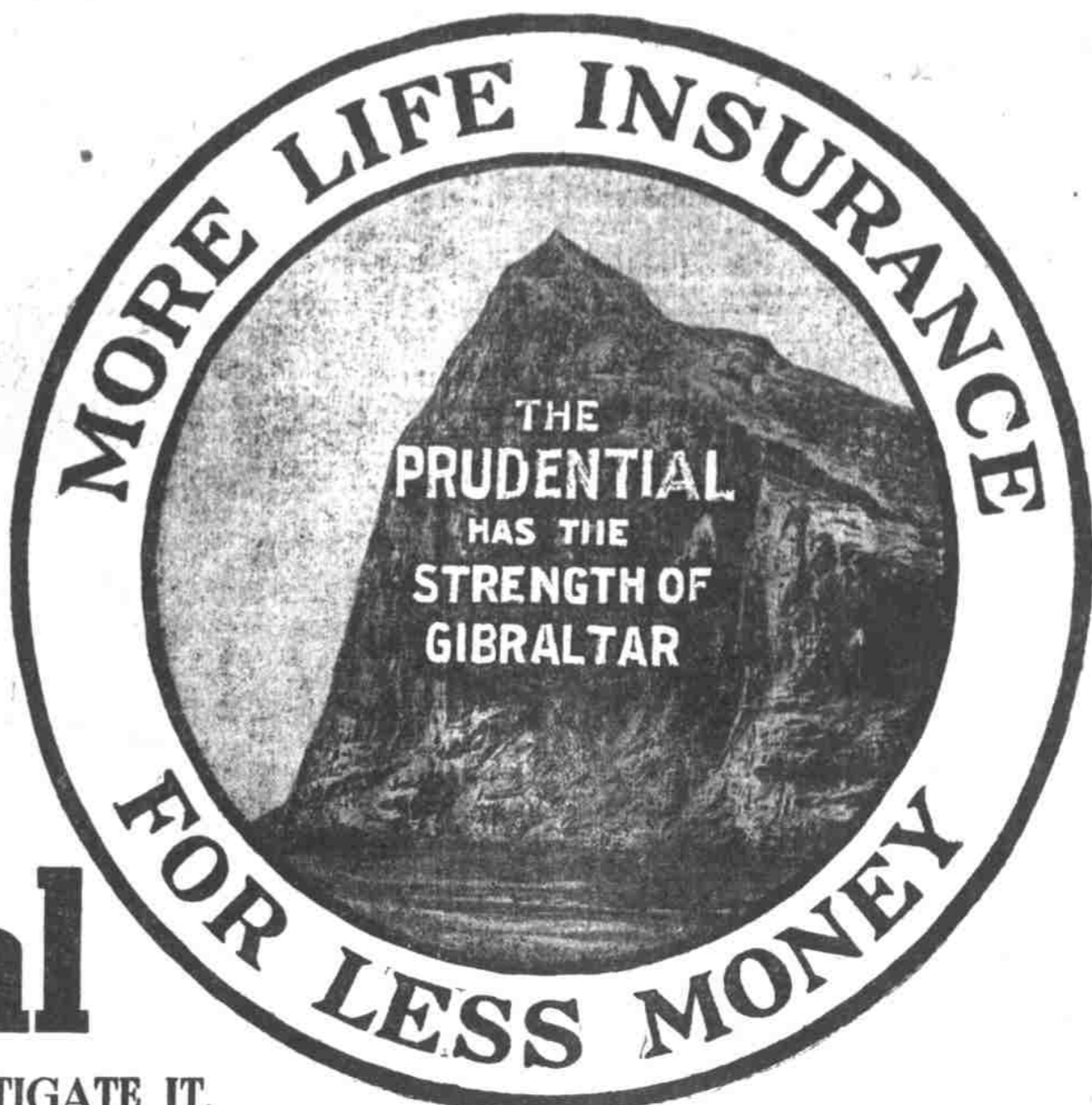

CITIZENS ORGANIZE A WATER COMPANY

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Grants Pass, Or., Aug. 17.—The city council has granted a franchise to the Lincoln Park Water company, which is composed of local people. This new incorporation has for its object the supplying of well water to the residents of Lincoln park, a suburb of this city. Lincoln park has become a popular residence part of Grants Pass, and it is beyond the reach of the city water system. The residents of that section propose to install a system of their own. A huge well, with drifts and tunnels penetrating the lower strata, will be dug and a pumping plant placed. Pipe lines will convey the water to the several residences and yards. Though the park is located on a ridge above the town it has found by test that there is an abundance of water close beneath the surface.

IDAHO INAUGURATES UNIQUE AD STUNT

(United Press Leased Wire.) Boise, Idaho, Aug. 17.—The Boise Valley Water Users' association has just devised a scheme to advertise Idaho irrigation projects. In the east and south of the states of Iowa, Minnesota, Wisconsin, Kansas, Illinois, Missouri and Texas are to be visited by representatives from this state, who will exhibit moving pictures at the state fairs showing what is being done in the matter of irrigation in Idaho. The Water Users' association has also prepared souvenir postal cards by which residents here may inform friends in the above named states of the dates and places of the proposed picture entertainments, at the same time sending them tickets of admission.

NAVAL STRENGTH OF JAPAN ESSENTIAL

(United Press Leased Wire.) Tokyo, Aug. 17.—That the increase of the military and naval strength of Japan is indispensable to the maintenance of peace in Asia and on the Pacific ocean is the gist of an interview given out by Prince Ito, resident general of Korea, today. The prince criticizes the recent action of the new Katoera government in deciding to postpone plans for the augmentation of the army and navy until 1911. "It is necessary for Japan to have a great army and a great navy if peace is to be maintained in Asia and on the Pacific ocean," said Prince Ito. The statesman declared that he considered the reforming of Korea his sacred mission on earth and warned the people against criticism of Japan's methods abroad. These criticisms are superficial, he said.

TAXES TO GO TOWARD PARK FUND

Men Believes It Can Raise \$1000 a Year in This Way—Dog Owners Will Cooperate.

Washington, Aug. 17.—An ordinance now being prepared by the attorney providing that the money raised as dog tax be devoted to the maintenance of a fund for park purposes. It is believed that it will net the sum of \$1,000 by the end of the year. Police say that even \$1,000 is enough for the number of dogs in D. C. as they believe that some percentage of this tax when it is the general opinion that it is easier to collect if the money is used for park purposes.
