(Continued from Page One.) Teachers in schools of more than one room, \$66.35; the average monthly salary for principals in schools of more than one room, \$38.87. The number of male teachers employed in this state last winter was 283, female, 3,460. Total, 3,743. The amount paid for teachers' salaries during the year was \$1,719,914.54, number of teachers in private schools, 333; pupils enrolled in those schools, 6,312. The school officers throughout the state report the compulsory education law passed by the last legislature a success, that all its provisions have proved practicable. The statistics seem to bear out the reports. The average daily attendance for 1907-1908 shows an increase of 17,378 over the previous year. In 1899 there were but 14,000 children in the state. During the past year there were in operation 43 four-year high schools, 35 three-year schools, 13 two-year schools and 37 one-year high schools. The number of pupils receiving eighth grade diplomas this year was 3,772.
