

# TIME ONLY DEEPEIS THE HEDBERG MYSTERY

## Two Weeks Pass With Absolutely No Trace of Wealthy Wisconsin Farmer Who Vanished at Umatilla on the Night of August 5.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)

La Grande, Or., Aug. 19.—G. H. Hedberg of Ashland has been in this city looking for a trace of his missing relative, Ephraim Hedberg, who disappeared after stepping from the train at Umatilla, while en route from Cumberland, Wis., to Ashland.

No clue as to the whereabouts of the aged man could be obtained in La Grande, and Mr. Hedberg turned back at this point. He will search the Walla Walla country next.

Mr. Hedberg was a retired farmer of Cumberland, Wis., on his way to Ashland, Or., in company with his daughter Elina, aged 26, and in passing through Umatilla on the night of August 5 he stepped off for a moment to get a cup of coffee, and since that moment has not been seen or heard of.

Ephraim Hedberg was 62 years of age, about five feet six inches in height,

weighed about 125 pounds, had black hair and sandy moustache and was dressed in a common business suit with soft hat and shirt and had drafts for \$1,000 in his pockets on the Cumberland State bank of Cumberland, Wis. When last seen he was in good health and perfectly sane. It is believed he met with foul play.

He was on his way to Ashland to invest in property and was accompanied by his daughter, who immediately missed her father, but who supposed he was in another car of the train and that he would soon come to his seat. But upon the failure of the father to return the daughter then thought that he had been left at Umatilla and that he would follow on the next train and so she proceeded to Ashland, where she still anxiously awaits news of her father.

All the banks in the country have been notified of the disappearance and the thought who will spend several weeks making a personal search, is at a loss to know where to begin.

### MARCH SHIP ARRIVES OUT.

French Bark Jules Gomme at Queenstown From Columbia River. A cable announced today the arrival at Queenstown of the French bark Jules Gomme, hence March 23 with a cargo of wheat. This is one of the slowest passages made from this port to Europe this season and it is supposed that she encountered severe weather.

While the Jules Gomme made a slow run she nevertheless beat the Norwegian ship Colonna which left here the same day bound for the same destination. The Colonna has not yet been reported. She is a considerably smaller vessel than the Frenchman, the latter being of 1,902 tons register and the Norwegian 1,357. Besides the Colonna of the March fleet there are now 13 windjammers on the way from this port to Europe with wheat cargoes, the greater number having sailed in April.

### CANNERIES DID WELL.

Report From Bristol Bay Says Salmon Catch Was Big.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Astoria, Aug. 19.—The steamer North Star, the first of the Alaska salmon fleet to arrive, reports the Bristol Bay salmon pack large. The three canneries packed as follows: Alaska Packers' Association, 45,000 cases; Portland Alaska Fishing company, 55,000 cases; Columbia River Packers' Association, 41,000 cases. The other canneries of the Nisqually all had good crops. The American ship Henry V. Lind, with the Alaska fleet, left August 6 and should arrive here in a week or 10 days. The other vessels of the fleet sailed about August 10 and will arrive about two weeks later.

### ALONG THE WATERFRONT.

The British steamer Boyette which is loaded to come here for a shipment of lumber for Australia is at present discharging cargo at San Francisco.

No news from the steamer Aeon from this port. The craft is now nearly three weeks overdue.

The oriental liner Alesia will begin loading flour this afternoon at Alden dock, with the Alaska fleet. Half of the flour cargo this trip, all of it weighing a few hundred barrels goes to the Orient. The entire cargo will measure about 54,000 barrels.

The British ship Anceles cleared last night for Liverpool with a cargo of lumber valued at \$242,000. Half of the cargo, or 769,125 feet were taken on at London and 763,325 feet were taken on at Astoria. The Anceles got a new list night and is in the stream off Linton today receiving supplies for the voyage.

## ONE FIRM BIDS ON WATER BONDS

# CONFESSES TO ROBBERY

## A 17-Year-Old Discharged Clerk Admits Having Burglarized Love Drug Store and Sub-Postal Station—Goods Recovered.

Despite the assurance of W. S. Love, the East Burnside druggist who was robbed Monday night that Thomas Perkins, a clerk recently discharged, could not have committed the crime, the police last evening arrested him and obtained a confession.

Because Perkins is only 17 years old he will not be prosecuted by the police authorities, but instead will be turned over to the United States officials, who know no distinction where a post-office robbery is concerned.

This morning Detectives Hellyer and Tennant accompanied the drug clerk to several pawnshops where he asked them in recovering the articles he confessed to stealing from the residence of Fred Jennings, Irvington, and two other houses.

When Captain Baty and Detective Hellyer questioned Love yesterday morning the druggist declared the nature of the crime and the way it was done precluded any possibility of Perkins having committed it. Love said, however, that Perkins had been discharged for suspected dishonesty, and the detective at once set to work. Perkins' right hand is scarred, so they looked in the pawnshops for a man answering his description. The goods he had pawned tallied with the descriptions of those stolen.

Early in the day it was learned that Perkins had hired a long stay at a stable at Nineteenth and Washington streets. He was traced to Vancouver, but apparently nowhere in his mind on the night of the robbery he had committed the previous night, he soon returned to Portland. When he reached the farm he was arrested and soon made a confession.

Suspicion of Love's books for the post-office robbery was also cleared up yesterday showed that a total of \$225 had been stolen from the government and the druggist.
