

DEEDS HUSBAND

Mrs. Annis Declares Firm Faith and Lays Purden of Blame on T. Jenkins Hains—Annis and Mrs. Hains Only Friends.

(Special Press Leased Wire) New York, Aug. 19.—After the cottage leaving the body of her husband had left her home today on its way to the cemetery, Mrs. William F. Annis, wife of the prominent magazine publisher who was killed by Captain Peter C. Hains, U. S. A., this afternoon gave out a remarkable statement in which she expressed her absolute belief in the innocence of her husband and consigned her life to vindicating his character.

"At the time the divorce suit was brought my husband tried to get Captain Hains to reason but was unsuccessful. At the proper time the part that T. Jenkins Hains played in the terrible murder will come out. It has not been even partly explained. As soon as I recover from the terrible shock I shall have my lawyers prepare a full statement of the case, showing just what part T. Jenkins Hains played in the murder, and all about it. I will sign that statement, which will set forth the true facts. My only object in life now is to vindicate my husband's character and clear his name."

INDIANS HOLD FIRST ELECTION

Klamath Falls, Or., Aug. 19.—The first election ever held by the Indians on the Klamath reservation took place a few days ago for the purpose of electing a council which will represent the tribes represented on the reservation in all matters of importance. 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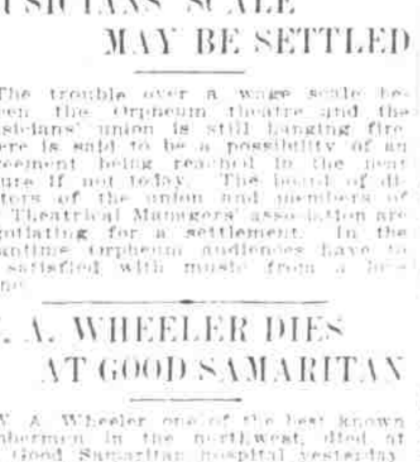
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BARBER FILLED WITH SHOT, MAY RECOVER
