SAFETY DEVICE WILL REDUCE TRAIN WRECKS TO MINIMUM

A Portland man who for years has been an employee of the O. R. & N. has invented what experts say is the safest safety device known to modern railroading, and which makes collisions practically impossible where it is used. The invention is to be given a trial this week by the eight general superintendents of the Harriman lines who are holding a semi-annual conference in this city.

J. Shannon, the inventor of the device, has been conducting his experiments at Graham station, near Montavilla. He says that the trials have met with complete success. The device is simple and is intended to supplement the work of the semaphore. It consists of a spring of hollow plate placed near the rail within the track. Whenever the semaphore arm goes down, that is, points to safety, and shows the track is clear, the spring releases itself and is at a level with the rail.
