### Council Committee Refuses to Recommend Kellar's Resolution Against S. & S. Company Maintaining a Slaughterhouse in City.

Councilman Kellar had another round with the Schwartzschild & Sulzburger company this morning when he appeared before the health and police committee and asked to have the committee recommend for passage his resolution compelling the Schwartzschild & Sulzburger company to cease slaughtering within the city limits.

In the debate that arose over the measure, Councilman Willis moved Kellar to have special permits for the city and Kellar replied with some heat that he did not believe in special permits for the city.

Further he contended that the special permit issued to Louis Zimmerman is illegal because the council has no right to issue special permits.

Despite Kellar's fight against the plan, the resolution was not carried. The resolution was carried by a vote of 10 to 10.

Kellar said that whatever the conditions are, the city has provided that no slaughtering shall be done within the city, and that inasmuch as a few have been found to violate this law, it is the duty of the city to see that the law is enforced.

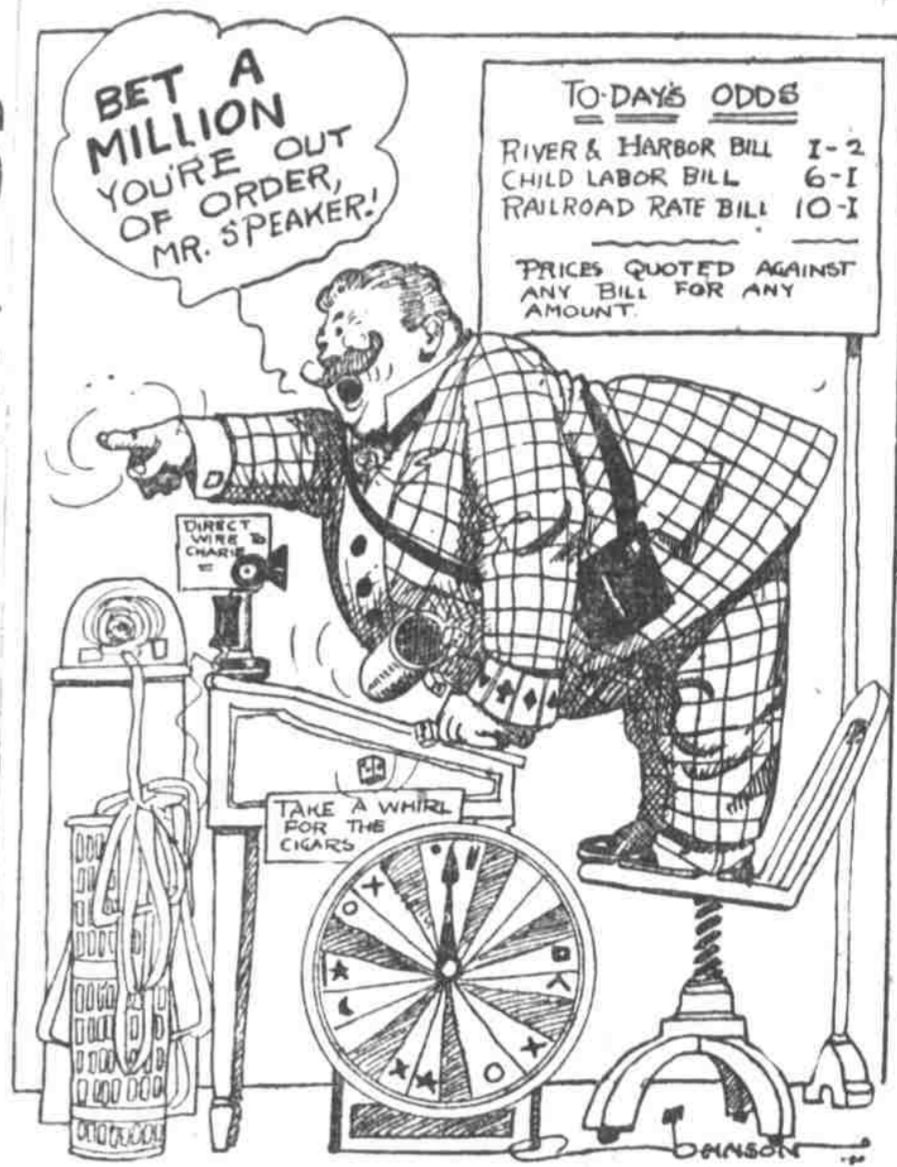
