Coasters Will Put State League and Northwestern to the Bad.

Los Angeles, Cal., Aug. 21.—War will be carried into the enemy's country by the Pacific Coast team, according to the announcement made today by President Ed Lwing. He said that steps would be taken against the Outlaw State league and at the same time the contest for the Pacific northwest territory taken up to the national commission.

Ewing believes the state leagues can be put out of commission by robbing it of its best players. He said, however, that the move was not dictated by the coast league would not be reinstated.

The magnate said that while no representation has been made to anyone in Seattle to bring that city into the coast league, he would not see an eight-team league in the northwest territory.

Arrangements for the organization of a new team here, which will probably play under the colors of Venice, are well advanced and a meeting will meet local magnates to effect formal organization early next week.
