Hillsboro Feels Impetus of Electric Lines Building From Portland.

Hillsboro, which for several years lagged along serenely without making much progress, has of late taken a sudden jump and is going ahead rapidly, according to S. C. Killen, editor of the Independent, published in that town, who is in Portland today.

"The mill condensers are what is transforming the whole country," says Mr. Killen. "Many of the old farmers are giving up the old way of farming—plowing, sowing and reaping—and waiting until the next year for their returns, and are going into dairying—the returns are better and more immediate."

"The Southern Pacific is considering the building of a new depot at Hillsboro and the people are getting together to figure out what sort of a building they want."

BIG SUM FOR WHITE SALMON ACREAGE

The largest deal that has ever been consummated in White Salmon fruit lands was closed yesterday when James H. McVicker and Peter M. Baker purchased from Meredith Jones a 1,300-acre tract in the heart of the fruit belt, 10 miles from White Salmon. The land was sold for a little more than \$100,000. The total consideration being \$40,000. All of the land is admirably adapted to fruit culture. 60 acres now being set in apples. The purchasers intend to clear the entire tract in next year, and to sell the fruit in small tracts. The White Salmon district is fast becoming as famous for fruit culture as the Hood River valley lands there having greatly increased in value during the past few years.

FUTURE FULL OF FIRE HYDRANTS

At the meeting of the Multnomah Improvement club at headquarters in the hall on Mississippi avenue and Shaw streets, Wednesday night, discussion of several important matters was heard.

Mr. L. N. Davis for the street committee reports that the contract for improvement of Slaves street between Commercial street and Williams avenue had expired July 29 and the street had not been touched. Also that the contract for Mason street which was let April 27, expires October 25, and no work has been done on it.

Many of the water mains in the section of the city which comes under the supervision of the Improvement club have not been replaced with larger mains. The property owners feel that the city should be responsible for supplying its citizens with water should replace these mains and give adequate supply to residents.

SISTERS ACCUSE EACH OTHER

Hawthorne Estate Mixup Leads to General Family Feud.

Mrs. Catherine H. Collins has filed an answer to the application of her sister, Mrs. Louise H. Boise, for a writ of mandamus to compel her to allow an examination of the books of the Hawthorne estate, of which Mrs. Collins is secretary.

Mrs. Collins expresses the belief in her answer that the purpose of her sister has in view is to compel disclosure of evidence in her possession as to the will of Mrs. Boise's husband, Whitney Boise, who is charged with embezzlement. She denies that Boise was ever an agent of the Hawthorne estate.

Mrs. Collins also charges that her sister, who was secretary of the estate before Mrs. Collins succeeded to the office, failed to turn over all the records of the estate to her.

Captain Lorenzo D. Baker, a native who has just died in Boston, at the age of 68, raised the banana from the position of a curiosity to that of a staple. In 1870 a few hundred bunches of the fruit came to the United States; the annual production are valued at something like \$6,000,000.

LOCAL BISHOP IN ENGLISH CHURCH

"The Church in America and Her History" is the title of a sermon delivered by Right Rev. Charles Scadding, bishop of Oregon at Lewisham parish church, and reprinted in the Church Family Newspaper of London. In this sermon Bishop Scadding sketches the history of the daughter church, the church of America, and illustrates the unity of the Church of England and its branch in the United States, while emphasizing the independence of the American church from the entanglements of state.

Of the great field for home mission work Bishop Scadding says: "Most of the great states of the far west are organized as missionary districts, and most of the home mission work is done within them. But help also has to be given to some of the older dioceses, so that it is true to say that the home missions extend from the northeastern corner of Maine to Oregon, a stretch of 4,000 miles or more; and from the northwestern corner of Washington to the southeastern tip of Florida, another 4,000 mile line. Besides Porto Rico, far to the southwest, the Hawaiian and the Philippine Islands in the Pacific ocean. Thus the church's domestic mission stretch half way round the world."

Of the peculiar problems to be met by the church in America, he says: "Mormonism, sectarianism, secularism, lynchings, divorce, the negro, the Indian, the labor problems, and various other evils are pressing thick upon us. All the weaknesses and dangers that you in England see in America we churchmen are aware of, and the church is bravely meeting them."

"We are no sect, no mushroom growth of yesterday, but the church of the living God, the pillar and ground of truth, and we can trace our descent back from prayer book crosses at the Golden Gate to the cross at Canterbury, Ephesus, to Jerusalem, until we stand in the very footprints of our ascended Lord who said: 'Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature, he that believeth and is baptized shall be saved.'"

WANTS TEN THOUSAND BREACH OF PROMISE

Alleging that George H. Gules has "wantonly and insolently" broken his engagement to marry her, Vernia Ryan has begun suit in the circuit court to receive him for \$10,000 as damages for her disappointment.

The complaint fixes October 29, 1905, as the date of the engagement. For nearly three years, according to the complaint, she has patiently waited for him to fulfill his promise. She asserts that his failure to marry her within a reasonable time has wounded her feelings, injured her reputation and destroyed her future prospects.
