LA LONGE'S BAT WINS FOR OAKS

Raps Out Two-Bagger With Bases Full—Beavers' Errors Help.

Oakland, Aug. 22.—(By E. J. Lense, whom Manager Van Haltern borrowed from San Francisco, drove out a two-bagger in the ninth inning yesterday with the bases full and tonight home two men winning the game from the Beavers, 2 to 1. Rose, the new Texan on Manager McCredie's staff, had the locals swinging their heads off for eight innings, and but for fagged support would have probably scored a shutout.

Unless base-running on the part of the Beavers in the ninth inning, when three hits were made, kept the visitors' score down. Christian, the Greek new recruit, pitched an excellent game. Portland made the first and only score in the sixth inning. Casey was safe at first when Anderson erred in handling his ground ball. He took second on Basey's infield out and scored on Ote Johnson's whizzing three-bagger that sailed above Van Haltern's head in center field.

Here is the way Oakland capped a victory. Conroy's burn allowed Helmtmuller to reach first. Basey took care of Truck Egan's long fly and held Helms at first. Slattery was sent in in the ninth to bat for Cook. He drove the ball past the infield, enabling Helmtmuller to reach middle station. Casey booted Lewis' grounder. With the bases full La Longe rapped out a stinging two-bagger.

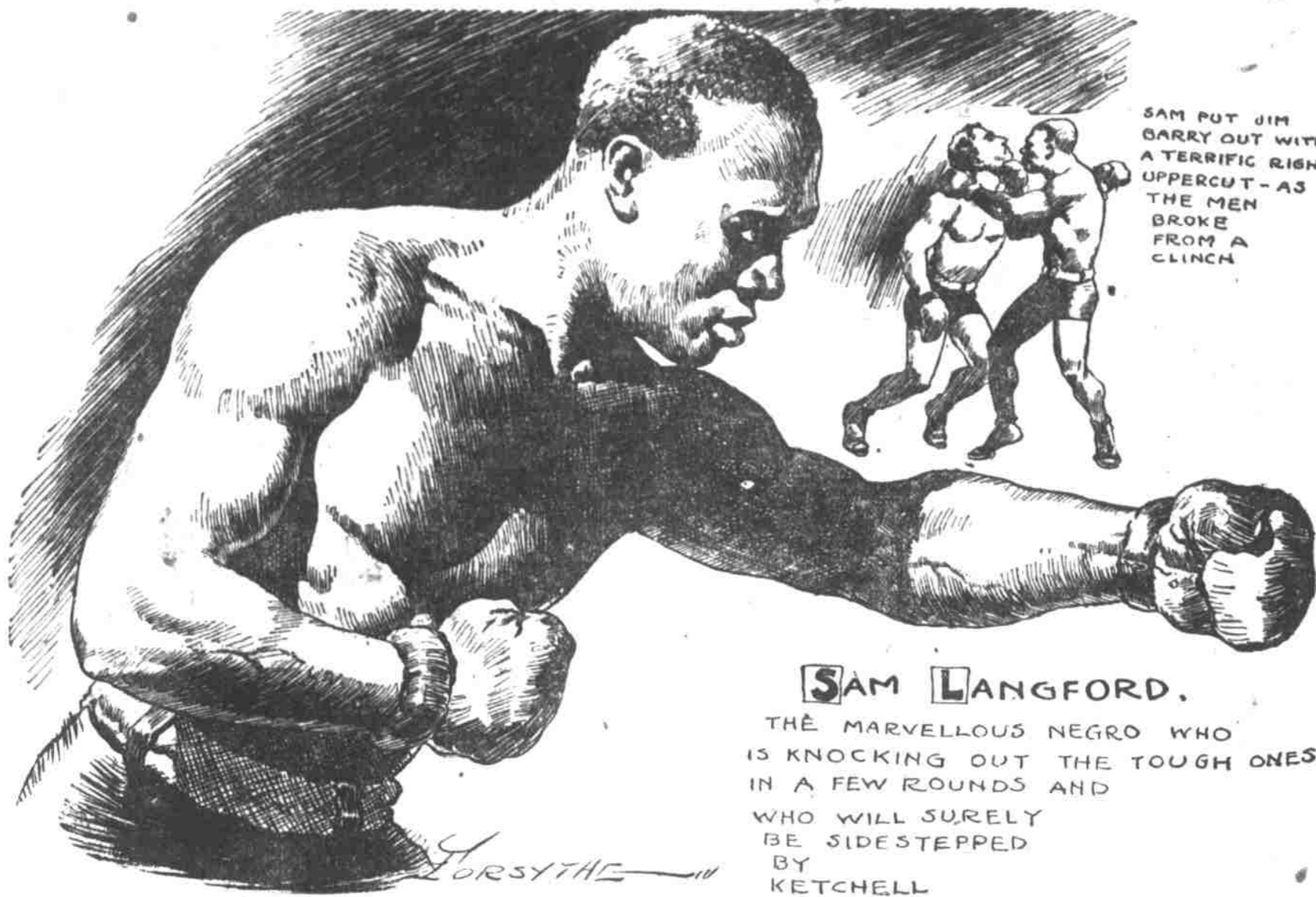

COAST'S SPEEDY RACERS TO COME

Western Pacific Fair Circuit Now Completed in All Details.

Beginning next week and continuing without lapse for the next two months Portland harness horsemen and livestock breeders will be rounding their respective circuits which, this year offer greater inducements for top-notch speed contests and classy stock exhibits than any previous year. Portlanders will be represented at the initial race meets to be held at Sacramento and Bellingham and also at Marshfield. The results at Sacramento will be watched with greatest interest because a majority of the speedsters that are to contend for stakes at the California State Fair, there, are headed for Portland for the local club races here September 21-25. Although there will be about a score of California horses entered in the various events at Sacramento which will appear here.

At Bellingham, the first annual North Pacific Fair circuit as reorganized and enlarged will open Tuesday with about 40 Oregon trotters and pacers in the list.

One of the most important announcements made in connection with the livestock industry of the northwest in a long time is the news received here, only a day or so ago, of the consummation of the long-sought for Western Pacific Fair circuit. W. E. Skinner, founder of the Chicago International Livestock show has just notified M. D. Wisdom, with whom he has been engaged in working out this comprehensive project that the necessary preliminaries have been arranged, that the circuit will be an actuality next year, and that with perhaps a couple of modifications the dates for the various exhibitions are settled upon.

This circuit will mean the sure drawing of eastern livestock interests into the northwest, a desire which the men behind the project have had in view for a long time. The chain of fairs will extend from Minnesota out to the Pacific coast taking in the leading cities along the northern boundary and then swinging down to include Portland, Salem and back to Salt Lake and Denver.

The ten cities which are to form the circuit are as follows: Humble, Minn., August 30-September 4; Fargo, N. D., September 6-11; Billings, Mont., September 12-17; Portland, Or., September 21-25; Spokane, Wash., September 29-October 3; Seattle, Wash., October 11-15; Boise, Idaho, October 15-19; Salt Lake, Utah, October 20-24; Sacramento, Cal., August 30-September 4; Salem, Or., September 12-15.

KETCHEL GOES SOUTH IN AUTO

Try for Fight With Burns—Snailham Proves One Grand Fizzle.

(United Press Leased Wire.) San Francisco, Cal., Aug. 22.—Stanley Ketchel, champion middleweight pugilist of the world, left here at 6:30 o'clock this morning for Los Angeles at the wheel of a White steamer. With him went his manager, Joe O'Connor. While in the south the men will arrange the terms of the Ketchel-Papke match when the heavyweight champion returns from Australia.

From what O'Connor said before he left today, it seems likely that a chance of the match being declared off has departed. O'Connor said that if Papke insisted on 156 pounds he would make these conditions as he is sure that Ketchel can win the fight.

In a statement made last night O'Connor stated that Papke must make 158 pounds, or the fight would be declared off. While he is in Los Angeles O'Connor will visit Billy Neal, Burns' manager, at Monrovia, to try to make arrangements for a fight with the heavyweight champion. O'Connor took \$2,500 with him today to post as a forfeit if there is any chance of getting the match. If arrangements are made, it is likely that Coffroth will pull off the match in San Francisco on New Year's day.

AMERICAN WEIGHT CHAMPIONS HOME

(United Press Leased Wire.) New York, Aug. 22.—Matt McGrath, John J. Finnegan and Ralph Rose, the three Americans who won the weight-throwing championships at the Olympic games, arrived here today on the liner Celtic from England and were met at the pier by a large crowd of their friends.

They toured Ireland after the games at London and were received cordially and made much of in all parts of the island. They will be among the leading athletes to be given here next Saturday.

Rose will remain in the east a month or two before returning to his home in California. He expects to capture a few national championships and take part in several games before he starts west. All three of the champions expressed their entire satisfaction with the results of the London games in spite of the many complaints made by the Americans of unfairness on the part of the English judges.
