

KEY WINS HIS FIGHT

Bureaucrats Are Downed in Contest Over Construction of Navy—Concessions to Plans for Delaware—Two Outspoken Critics.

Washington, D. C., Aug. 22.—Officials of the navy department are in receipt of information from Newport, R. I., where the naval college has been in session to the effect that Commander Key is winning out in his fight against the bureau of construction of the navy and securing a number of important concessions to plans for the construction of the new battleships of the Delaware class, now in the shipyards.

Commanders Key and Sims have been two of the most outspoken critics of the plans for the new warships, either within or outside the navy. Their positions as advisers to the president have been of great value in enabling them to present their views with the most force and effect.

Official circles here it is said that Key and Sims have won out in their contention as to the fitting of armor belt and ammunition boxes. They are contending also for four decks and larger guns on the new ships of the Delaware class.

They argue that the decks of the new ships should be fitted with armor plates which, they hold, are impervious and serve to protect the low bow working of the ships and to prevent the possibility of being carried away by the enemy.

As a consequence there will be a shake-up in the personnel of the bureau of the navy and new blood will be infused generally. This will mean the death knell of the present regime, which the navy and army have long grown to an abhorrence.
