

DROP A COIN AND GATE OPENS

Electrical Device to Be Used at the Country Club Show.

The Country Club and Livestock association will employ a novel device for "gate-keeping" during the races and livestock show next month. Following the example of the state fair management at Salem the association here will install an electrical coin-in-the-slot machine which turns only when the coin of the proper denomination is dropped in the slot and registers every admission at the same time.

This plan will save much labor and confusion, for in connection with it will be several "get-your-change" booths where the crowds unless they happen to have the exact fee of admission will line up, get their change and then the automatic turnstile does the rest. This system of gatekeeping has been adopted at many fair meetings in the east and it is said to be uniformly successful.

The directors of the Country Club have another weekly meeting this afternoon, where the engineers' estimates on the cost of running the two streets for automobiles and other vehicles from West avenue to the racetrack entrance will be submitted as well as the details of the cost of the new bleachers, which will adjoin the steel grandstand which is now under roof.

BUSY WEEK FOR CITY OFFICIALS

Important Matters of Legislation to Come Up at Meetings of Council.

Commencing this afternoon there will be one of the busiest weeks at the city hall that the city officials have known in many months. Much legislation of important nature will be handled while extra meetings are held that will take up much time and discussion.

Another meeting at the city hall this afternoon will be that of the school directors. The meeting promises to be interesting because of the action to be taken in regard to the purchase of the property at Couch and Davis and Seventeenth and Eighteenth streets for a site for a new high school building.

Reports of the recent test of the power on the streetcar line on Sandy road will be made, and it is understood that the company has made the changes necessary to carry the test load equal to a haul of 50 cars carrying 125 passengers each.

CAPTAIN EGBERT HAD BUSY LIFE

The funeral of Captain George Egbert, formerly a deputy United States marshal for Oregon, first mayor of Fargo, N. D., and the first master Mason in the territory, who died Saturday night, aged 87 years, was held this morning from Holman's undertaking chapel, afterward the body being cremated, the Masonic order having charge of the ceremonies.

Captain Egbert came to Portland in 1890 from Fargo where he had been many years. In addition to having been mayor of Fargo for several terms Captain Egbert also published a paper there. Captain Egbert retired as a deputy marshal in Portland in 1895 and soon afterward was appointed a bailiff in the federal court which position he held until May, last year, when he was compelled to retire on account of his failing health.

Born in Pennsylvania in November, 1820, Captain Egbert, when a boy, went to Hastings, Minn., where he lived a short while. Later he took part in the Indian outbreaks, having organized a volunteer company for this purpose.

While living in Fargo Captain Egbert was married to Mrs. Sarah Savery, who is living at 800 Macadam road.

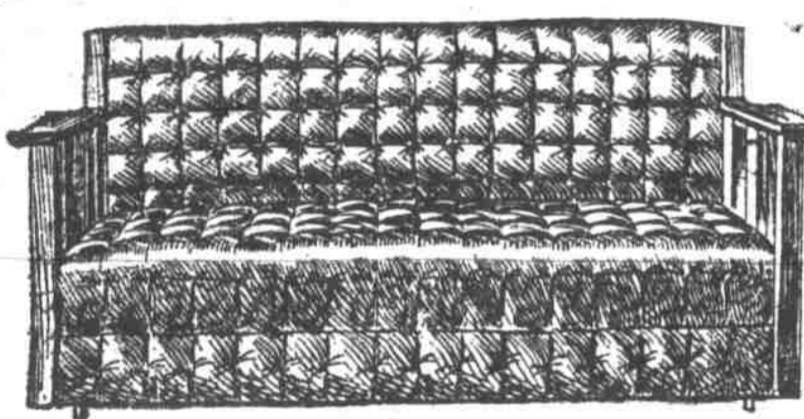

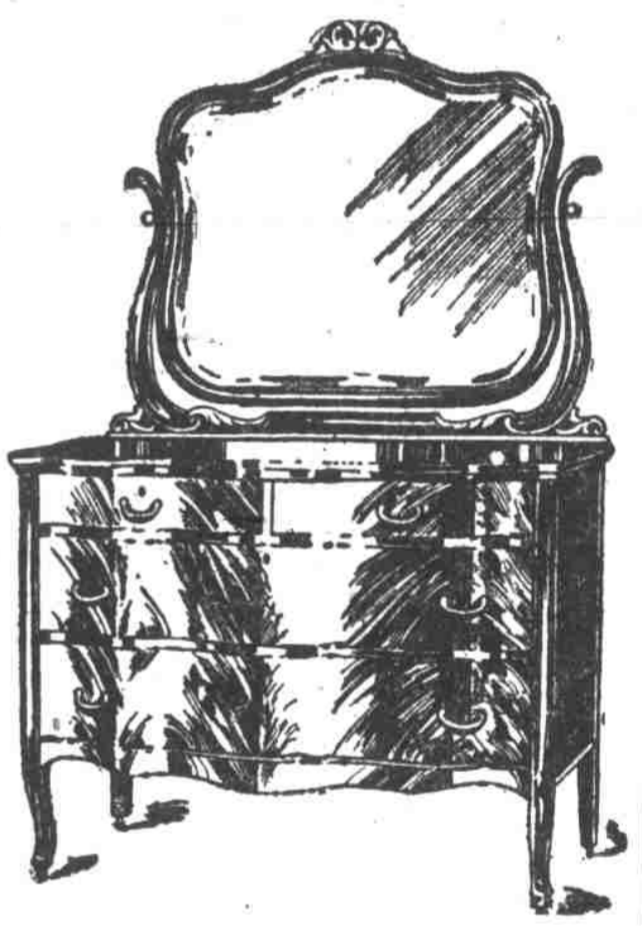
