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## 2 YEARS DEAD; MANIFESTS LIFE

### Reno Hutchinson Talks to Dr. E. L. House Through Third Person.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)  
Spokane, Wash., Aug. 25.—Dr. E. L. House, pastor of the Westminster Congregational church here, returned last Friday from Portland, where he was a pastor for several years. While in Portland he was the guest of a friend whom he had known for a long time, and who, through spirits, talked in Dr. House's presence with her dead brother and also Reno Hutchinson, who was murdered here about two years ago, while secretary of the Y. M. C. A. The doctor caused a great sensation when he spoke of the affair as he did. Dr. House was an intimate friend of Mr. Hutchinson.

The scenes resulted through a dinner conversation. The question of psychology came up and Dr. House expressed his views on the subject, which were rather skeptical. The woman offered to prove her spiritual sensitiveness. She said that the spirits of her brother and Reno Hutchinson she could call at will.

Through her brother she secured Mr. Hutchinson's spirit and engaged it in conversation by rapping three times on a table with a lead pencil.

"Is this Reno?" asked Dr. House.  
"Yes, and I am glad to see you," the medium's pencil slowly wrote, the hand of the writer moving as if not by her own accord. She did not go into a trance, however.

"Are you in the spirit world?" asked Dr. House.  
"Yes, you are in the spirit world?"

"What are you doing?"  
"I am busy here for one has more power."

"Do you know who murdered you?"  
"Do not know."

"What would Harve Stone say if he knew you were speaking?"  
"He would say it was daffy." This is said to be a characteristic reply of the Portland Y. M. C. A. secretary.

Dr. House then told him "Goodby," and the woman's hand fell limp on the pad on which she had been writing. During the conversation Dr. House said he asked of the medium a question, the answer to which was known only to his wife and himself. The answer written by the medium was not accepted by him but his wife thought it was all right.

"I am still skeptical about spirit messages," said Dr. House. "I have known the woman for years and she is a member of one of Portland's best known families."

Reno Hutchinson, while secretary of the local Y. M. C. A., and working for a new building, was murdered one evening as he was on his way home and was found in an alley the next day. The murderer left no clue and no reason was advanced.

The police throughout the northwest scoured the country but failed to find the murderer. Dr. House performed the wedding ceremony for Mr. Hutchinson and his wife. Mrs. Hutchinson is now living with her parents in Portland.

## OIL KING'S PASTOR RAPS BIBLE WORSHIP

### Full of Errors, He Declares—Condemns Effort to Make All Believe It—Flaws Evident.

New York, Aug. 25.—That "Bible worship" is doing more than atheism to empty the churches of the country is the assertion of Rev. Charles F. Aked, pastor of the fashionable Fifth Avenue Baptist church in this city, which John D. Rockefeller attends. He insists that there is no reason why the Bible should be considered above criticism or free from errors more than any other book that has been handed down from century to century, passing through scores of translations from one language to another.

"In the pages of the Bible," says Dr. Aked in the September Appleton's Magazine, "are to be found historical errors, arithmetical mistakes, inconsistencies, and manifold contradictions, and when a student writes a process, the most horrible crimes are committed by men who plead 'God said' in justification of their misdeeds."

"Moreover, the English Bible is a version of a version which is a translation of a translation. It has come down through Hebrew, Greek and Latin into English. In all its earlier stages it was copied by hand from one manuscript to another by ignorant writers, a process certain to result in many mistakes."

Dr. Aked insists that he is not attacking the Bible itself, but merely the claim for infallibility which has been set up for it, and he asserts that this claim for a book in which it is possible for a child to discover errors, and driving many intelligent people away from the church.

The right of every man to study and interpret the scriptures for himself, he holds, is as great now as it was in the time of Luther and Calvin and Zwingle, and such an independent attitude would do more to strengthen the hold of religion upon the multitude than any amount of preaching and teaching in defense of the infallibility of every passage in the Bible.

## ETHEL CHAPMAN, 16, CHAMP HIGH DIVER

He arrested Lethridge in a soft drink resort.

## TACTFUL JAP AVERTS A ROW

### Ignores Threats, at a Banquet, and Praises America Just the Same.

(United Press Leased Wire.)

Sydney, N.S.W., Aug. 25.—An Japanese feeling is sweeping over all Australia as the result of the visit of the American fleet and in all quarters the cry is resounding: "The whites must dominate the Pacific. The feeling grows stronger every day until it has become a potent, over-present influence. Only the remarkable tact of Kinsaburo Ueyo, the Japanese consul general at Sydney, today averted an extremely embarrassing situation at a reception of the officers of the fleet given by the Australian government. The diplomatic representative of Nippon disregarded all the veiled and open threats against his country, his people, which he could not fail to recognize.

"I vengo spoken in highest terms of praise of the American fleet," he said in a high compliment to Australia for the royal welcome extended to the ships and men, and said:

"There is no hope for Japan to go to Australia in the cordiality and heartiness of its reception to the American fleet Japan at least will try to equal Australia."

Japan's friendship for America is traditional and I know of nothing that will ever prevent the continuance and the strengthening of the bonds between the two nations."

It had been feared that Ueyo would make some reference to the prevailing sentiment and that his speech might have a breach that would lead to a row. His speech was well received and had a good effect.

The enthusiasm through the city continues and the reception here is being voted the greatest yet by the men of the fleet. Entertainments of various kinds are being given by the officers and are constantly the guests at dinners, banquets and receptions.

Chambers of 64th and Media streets, on the charge of stealing an apple.

This prisoner, who was the youngest to appear in the juvenile court since that tribunal was created, had been kicked by a seven-year-old boy in the neighborhood, and the probation officers in the courtroom dangled on Magistrate Gorman's knee, and he was taken into the house by Mrs. Chambers to await the arrival of the police.
