The ways and means committee of the city council yesterday received a communication from the Holiday-Improvement association asking that a fire engine house be established in the vicinity of East Twenty-second and Thompson streets. The letter was referred to the fire committee and the fire committee yesterday disclosed a change of sentiment upon the part of the residents in favoring the location of the fire engine house at the site suggested by the improvement association. Several weeks ago when objections were made to the letter yesterday stated that the association wanted the site named whether any persons objected to it or not.

William Butler is a bad-luck bartender. Wherever he works the saloon is robbed. Two east side saloons were visited by a burglar after he had been discharged, while another was looted before he was dismissed. Detectives Jones and Behner found him at Sixteenth and Washington yesterday afternoon, and as he could give no definite information as to his mode of living he was arrested as a vagrant. The peculiar coincidence of the robberies of Butler's ex-employers was explained by Acting Judge Swift this morning. He expressed his sympathy and gave Butler a sentence of five days on general principles.

The ladies and friends of Winslow Mead circle No. 7 and Blackmar circle No. 29 of Sellwood ladies auxiliary of the G. A. R., met at Columbia park last Tuesday and enjoyed a lovely picnic. After the luncheon which was spread on long tables a short impromptu program was given. The address was made by the comrade Adams of Sellwood. Mrs. Himes president of the ladies of the G. A. R. department of Oregon, who was elected president of the day, and others. Games were sung and games played. The occasion was much enjoyed by those who attended.

Portland will be officially represented at the opening of the north bank road if the council adopts the recommendation of the ways and means committee which was decided to act on the suggestion of Secretary E. C. Gilmer of the Chamber of Commerce to have a canal committee and Mayor Lane attend the opening ceremonies. Gilmer's communication stated that the opening is expected to take place some time between August 25 and September 1, but no specific date was mentioned.

Isaac Swift, who barely missed the appointment to the woodlark in the municipal court, is now sitting on the bench in the absence of Judge Van Zant, who is attending the convention of the American Bar association in Seattle this week. Mr. Swift has attended police court and set bounds the judges for the past two weeks to acquaint himself with the methods of dispensing justice. Judge Van Zant expects to be absent about one week.

Because the water pressure is so low that a supply cannot be forced to the third floor of the Lewis school, the building is being used for the morning school. 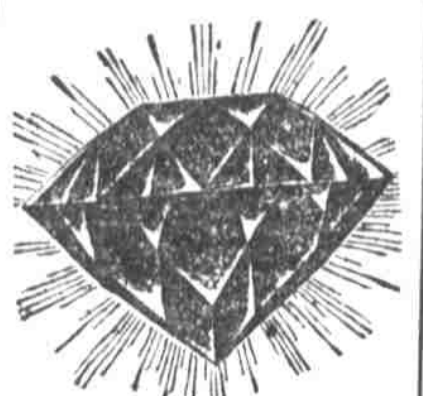

GO TO COOS BAY FOR FINE WOODS

Wehrung and Wisdom Will Carry Invitation to Country Club Show.

W. H. Wehrung of Hillsboro and M. D. Wisdom of Portland, president and secretary of the Oregon state commission for the A. V. exposition and director of the country club and live stock association, left for Coos bay this morning. They will kill two birds with one stone while in that country. From their long affiliation with the state board of agriculture and their important work in developing the business race game in the interest of the formation of Coos bay has interest at this time because they hope to secure a strong representation at the exposition at the fall now in progress there at the north Pacific race and stock meet here four weeks hence.

Another important mission of Wehrung and Wisdom to Coos bay is to secure a fine assortment of different kinds of woods grown in that section of the state for use and display in the Oregon State building at the Seattle fair.

At the meeting of the directors of the country club yesterday afternoon they were requested to issue a formal invitation to the management of the Coos bay fair to attend the race and stock show here next month.

The directors yesterday authorized the erection of bleachers at the country club track with a seating capacity of 4,000. This open pavilion will be built immediately adjoining the steel grandstand upon which work will soon be finished.

It was announced that if the association voted to accept them a goodly number of cars and tractors would be hung up by local business houses interested in the development of the livestock industry as well as the business race game. The directors thought it would be proper to accept such prizes in the different sports.

Action on the part of automobiles to pull off a 24-hour race for local and other drivers of the coast immediately after the race meet is ended was postponed as possible opposition to such a scheme has developed, particularly because it is proposed to make a Sunday race of it.

Announcement of the opening of the sale of boxes in the grandstand will be made in a few days.
