SENSATION IS SPRUNG BY LANG

Park Board Discovers Pig in Fence in Discussing Proposed Boulevard System.

At yesterday's meeting of the City park board, Isadore Lang, Ion Lewis and Dr. Dav Rafferty were appointed a committee to determine what recommendations the park board shall make to the city council in regard to the parking system to be provided by the \$1,000,000 bond fund, and after a discussion by the members of the board it is probable that one of the recommendations will be boulevards on both sides of the Willamette river as near to the river banks as possible.

Immediate action is deemed necessary by the board because of the increasing cost of land. Members of the board visited a site in Sellwood last Saturday and found that the land which is desired for a part of the parking system sold for \$35,000 that morning. The same condition is true in regard to the rest of the city and the city and the board is anxious to commence work as soon as possible.

The advisability of calling the Olmsted brothers to Portland to secure their advice in the matter was discussed but was put aside because of the delay which would ensue and the committee was appointed instead.

Mr. Lang sprung a sensation at yesterday's meeting when he stated that he had heard a remark attributed to a certain councilman to the effect that unless the park board secured the out right title to the land which he wanted he would do all he could to block the park board in the council.

Pliz Henry Gordon, in his answer filed yesterday to the suit for divorce brought by his wife, Flora Catherine Gordon, charges that she neglected her home and spent too much time gadding. He would come home from work in the evening and find her absent and have to turn in and get supper himself.

George High, a carpenter, was in the justice court yesterday afternoon to face a charge of larceny by bailor preferred by Miss Ruth Osborn, who alleged she gave High two diamonds to turn in and get supper himself. As Miss Osborn testified she paid \$100 for the pair and as other evidence against High was weak the case was continued until Monday morning.

A special meeting will be conducted in the Salvation Army hall, 249 Madison street, Wednesday night, August 26, by Brigadier and Mrs. Jenkins, provincial commanders for the work in Wyoming, Montana, Oregon, Idaho and Washington. They will be assisted by Major and Mrs. Faulkner, divisional officers for Oregon and Idaho, and other officers. Arrangements are being made for a big meeting. All are cordially invited to attend.

The United States wants a female collector for the forest service, department of agriculture, at \$800 per annum, and the civil service commission announces an examination to be held September 16 to secure eligibles from which to fill the vacancy. C. L. Minkler, who lives over a grocery at East Twenty-third and Liberty streets, reported to the police yesterday that twice Tuesday morning he chased three men, believed to be Italians or Greeks, away from his store. Driven away about midnight, they returned at 2:30 a. m. and were trying to break into the store when Minkler saw them.

A. H. Devers, A. E. Dizon and J. E. Richards, appraisers of the estate of Emille Closset, filed their report yesterday, estimating the value of the estate at \$15,500. Of this amount the principal item is 210 shares of stock in the coffee and spice company of Closset & Devers, valued at \$18,500.

A milk wagon team ran away on the Canyon road yesterday and collided with a Union Meat company wagon driven by Joseph Kasper. The tongue of the milk wagon pierced the shoulder and carried off the horses. Patrolman Leavens shot the interfering animal on request of the driver.

The watchman on the Alsworth dock saw what he believed to be smoke issuing from the floor of the dock at 2:30 this morning. He turned in a fire alarm, but the firemen soon discovered that the gas company was steaming on its pipes and one of these pipes under the dock was the cause of the alarm.

Water through hose for sprinkling yards or sidewalks or washing porches or windows must be paid for in advance and used only between the hours of 6 a. m. and 9 p. m. It must not be used for sprinkling streets. If used contrary to these rules or wastefully it will be shut off.

GROGERS GUESTS OF CREAM CO.

After Inspection of Plant Banquet Is Served to the Visitors.

The Portland Retail Grocers' association met last night in its bi-monthly meeting and enjoyed an evening as guests of the management of the Hazelwood Cream company. Through the association has an organization for carrying on its incidental business, the members regard the tour of the plant as part of their work the educational campaign which they have undertaken. At each regular meeting the association will visit some wholesale establishment which produces articles sold by grocers. Thus the retailers and the producers are brought into more harmonious relations and the visits react to the advantage of the consumer.

The campaign was begun with the last meeting when the members visited the Acme cereal and flour mills. Last night the Hazelwood store at Third and Hoyt streets was the place of meeting. M. Mortensen was the master of ceremonies. A large room had been fitted up with chairs for the business session, and after that was adjourned the guests were taken through the entire plant.

The plant was running full force and the guests had the opportunity of seeing the various stages in the process of butter, ice cream and the cream, cheese-making. The cold storage plant also was open to inspection. A banquet was served in one of the large rooms, many compliments were passed, both on the entertainment afforded and on the general work of the Pacific Coast Hazel company, the soap and pickle factories and other home industries are in line for later visits.

At the business session it was decided to give a ladies night probably September 15 at Hazelwood and finally a musical program and an informal dance will form the amusement, and invitations will be sent to the wives and families of the association members. A vote was taken to close the grocery stores all day Labor day, September 7, out of respect to the laboring element. Heretofore the stores have closed only half a day. If at all, J. C. Mann, president, was in the chair, and about 70 were present at what was one of the most enthusiastic meetings the association has ever held.
