

# VICE MUST CEASE AT BEACHES

Governor Fort of New Jersey Declares He Will Call Extra Session and Order Out Militia if Excise Law Is Not Obeyed.

Atlantic City and Other Pleasure Grounds Said to Have Openly Defied Authorities Who Would Enforce Sunday Law.

Beaumont, N. J., Aug. 27.—Governor Fort today issued a proclamation in which he declares that if the excise law requiring the closing of saloons on Sunday is not obeyed he will call an extra session of the legislature and possibly order out the militia to stop what he terms a "saturnalia of vice."  
The governor says the law has been disregarded flagrantly at all the coast resorts from Sandy Hook to Atlantic City, as well as in the inland cities. The state law is strong but is being enforced. The Sunday closing issue was the most prominent feature of the campaign last fall, when Fort was elected.

Governor Fort's pronouncement further denounces the action of the May's Landing grand jury which 16 days ago refused to indict Atlantic City saloon men for alleged violations of the law. He declares that the grand jury now in session is not likely to find indictments, and his threatened action in calling an extra session of the legislature is intended to show the grand jury the importance of the work before them.  
The governor claims he has affidavits from two men who purchased liquor last Sunday in Atlantic City saloons owned by grand jurors.

Recent exchanges explain that at Atlantic City and other resorts the excise law has been defied. Sunday last nearly every saloon on the board walk was open and the hotel bars running in full blast. Attention was immediately called to the state of affairs by the press but nothing was done, Governor Fort's proclamation followed.

## PLANS FOR GREATER FRISCO SUBMITTED

San Francisco, Cal., Aug. 27.—According to a report submitted today to the Greater San Francisco committee by the sub-committee on boundaries, the plan for a greater city will take in an immense territory around the bay shores. The border line as proposed by this committee begins near Bolinas Bay on the Marin county seashore, crosses the Marin peninsula at San Pablo straits, embraces Berkeley, Oakland, Alameda, Fruitvale and other towns as far south along the Alameda bay shore as Newark, crosses the bay to the Santa Clara county line, and thence follows the county boundary across the Santa Cruz mountains to the seashore at a point near Half Moon Bay. Altogether a dozen towns and cities, half of two counties and all of two others are included in the comprehensive plan.

**Anti-State Fair Injunction.**

Columbus, Ohio, Aug. 27.—A suit for injunction to prevent the holding of the Ohio state fair next week has been filed by the Smith Agricultural Chemical company because the directors refused to allow the company space for an exhibit. The petition alleges that the fair is not a public but a private corporation affair.

**Needham for Sixth Time.**

Modesto, Cal., Aug. 27.—Congressman James Carson Needham of the Sixth congressional district has been re-nominated for the sixth time, at the district convention here. The nomination was made by acclamation. Needham is the senior congressman from the Pacific coast. ## BITTER CLASHES OVER EXPOSITION.

### Japanese Fair May Be Abandoned If Political Differences Are Not Settled.

(United Press Leased Wire.)  
Tokyo, Aug. 27.—The clash over the question of postponing the Tokyo exposition has become so bitter that there are some intimations of abandonment today. All the commercial bodies of the country have aligned themselves against the cabinet, and the controversy is involving practically all interests, official and industrial.  
A majority of the members of the cabinet favor a postponement from 1912 until 1917, urging that more time is needed and that the present financial situation does not warrant the immediate appropriations for the rapid completion of the work. The chambers of commerce favor holding it in 1912, as first planned.  
The working people and poorer classes are in favor of the postponement, as they are supporting vigorously the policy of retrenchment being carried out by the cabinet.  
The unpopularity of President Kaneko with the masses led to the first complaints at the lavish expenditure of funds on the exposition, which now threaten to involve the whole government.

## NOT PROMOTING ANY REVOLUTION

### De Reus Denies Netherlands and America Plot Against President Castro.

The Hague, Aug. 27.—Minister De Reus, former Dutch minister to Venezuela, denies that the Netherlands, with the support of the United States, has aided the revolutionary movement in Venezuela. De Reus was in consultation at the foreign office all day, but nothing was given out as to the result of his conference.  
The government is quietly preparing for the blockade of Venezuelan ports that is sure to follow the refusal of Castro to apologize for his treatment of the Dutch minister.

## LEGOE SEES NO ART IN THE NUDE

### Iowa State Fair Enlivened Over Quarrel Over Absent Fig Leaves.

Des Moines, Iowa, Aug. 27.—The absence of the conventional fig leaf from the figures of Miss Elizabeth Sheets, a Des Moines, Iowa, china artist, has stirred up a war of artists in the Fine Arts building of the state fair here. F. C. Legoe of Watcher is the Anthony Comstock of the state fair, and he has carefully placed entry tickets on all the nude figures on the urns and vases painted by Miss Sheets.  
When Miss Sheets beheld the tickets taking the place of the absent fig leaves she burst into tears and demanded that they be taken off. The beauty of the female nude figure should not be spoiled, she said, by cardboard leaves.  
Legoe was obstinate and refused to consider the proposition. Then Miss Sheets declared that she would withdraw her painting from exhibition. This was also refused, and now Miss Sheets is hoping that the judges will remove the artificial clothing from the paintings before they render any decision.

## SELLS WHISKEY AND NOW FACES JAIL

La Grabe, Or., Aug. 27.—The case of Nels Holverson, for selling liquor in prohibition territory, will be tried before Judge J. W. Knowles of this city next Monday. Holverson runs soft drink establishments at both Hilgard and Kamela and is charged with having sold whiskey from these places. Three charges have been made against him. As the second offense calls for a jail sentence deep interest is centered in the case throughout this county, which is now dry.

## CALIFORNIANS HOLD CONVENTION

### Delegates Assemble at Oakland and Prepare for Formal Organization.

Oakland, Cal., Aug. 27.—Republicans are here today to attend the state convention which meets late this afternoon. The selection of presidential electors is the main business before the convention, but nothing but the formal organization will be attempted this afternoon, because the various speeches of welcome will have to be delivered.  
Considerable excitement is expected, however, from the Suffragettes, who will march to the convention in a body. They will be headed by Mrs. Theodor Pinter, who will carry a large yellow banner with "Votes for woman" inscribed upon it. The Republicans have set aside two rows of seats for the Suffragettes and they have promised not to attempt to interrupt the convention.  
The main business of the convention has been arranged in advance by the state central committee. Most of the electors already have been chosen. The convention will formally name the ticket tomorrow morning.  
The Republicans of several assembly districts will hold conventions today and tomorrow to select nominees for the next state legislature.

## PRETTY GIRLS TO GIVE TAFT CUP

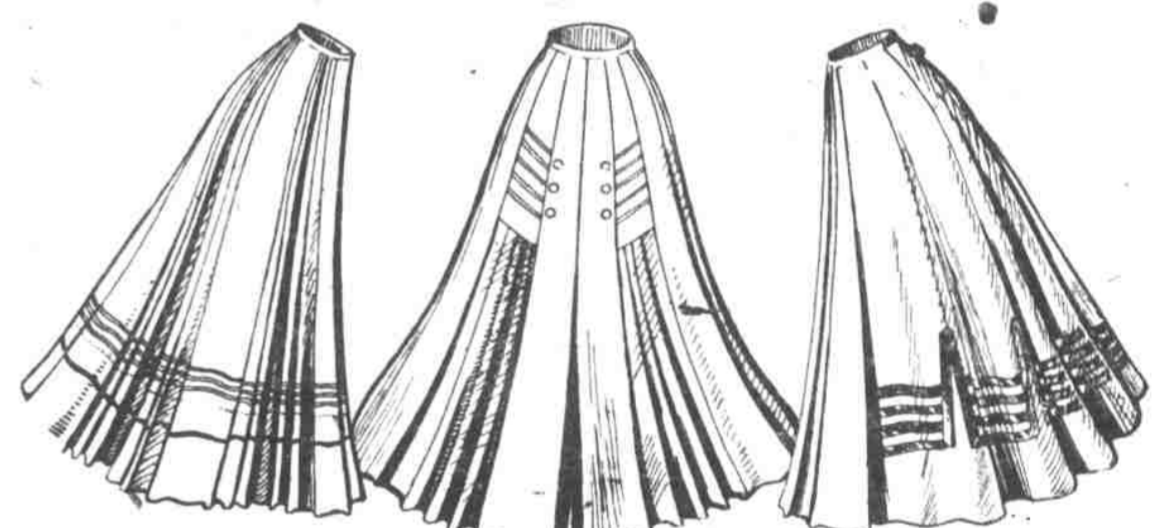
### Candidate Will Leave Hot Springs Hotel After Being Honored.
