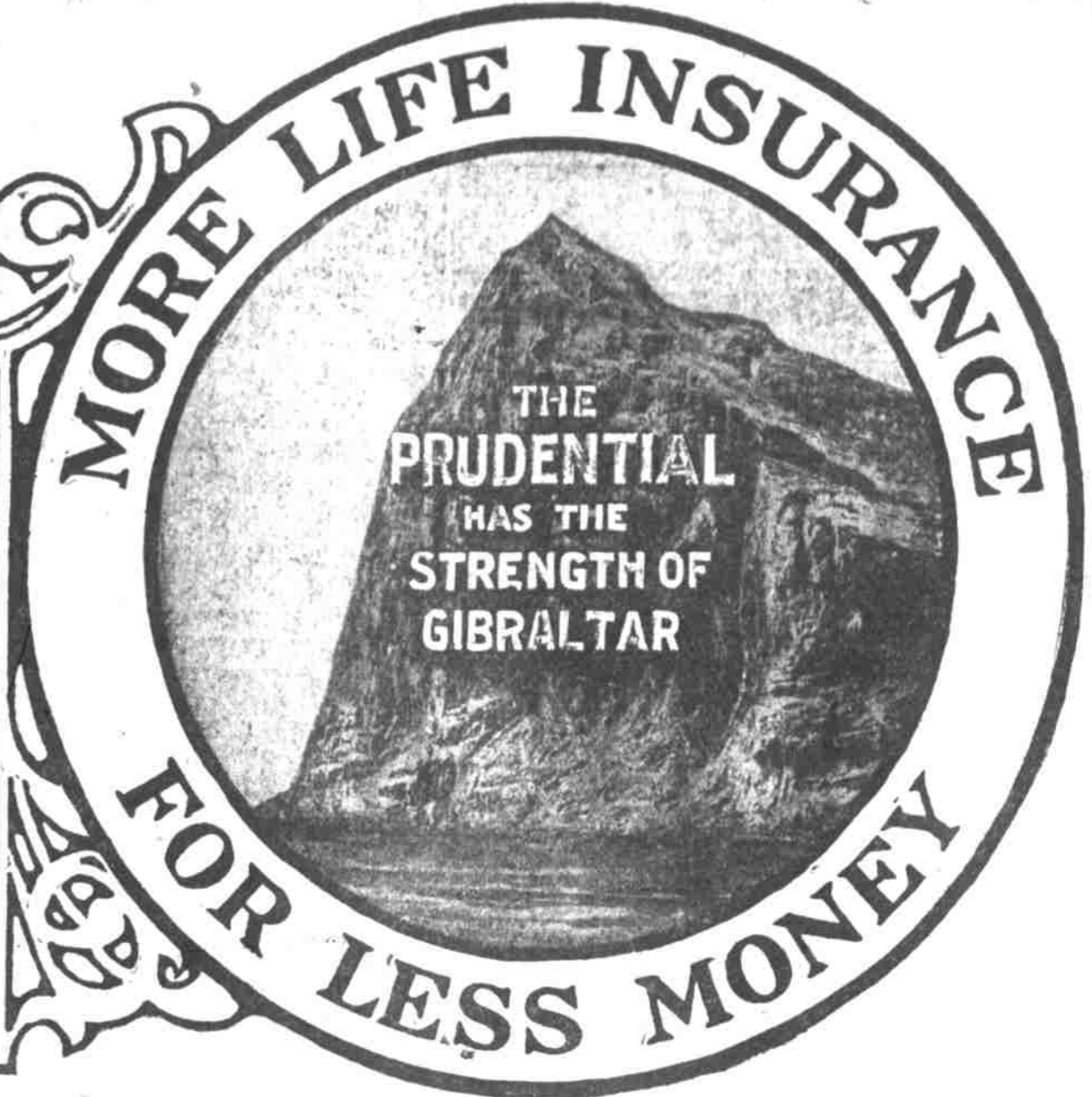

BAKER WILL DON WELCOME TOGS

Several Hundred Teachers Expected at Meeting in November.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal) Baker City, Or., Aug. 31.—The meeting of the eastern division of the state educational association, to be held in Baker City, November 22 to 25, including that has ever been held in this state. The association will employ at least two educators of national repute. The following prominent educators were proposed and the secretary is now in correspondence with them: Prof. W. JACKSON WILL BE TRIED HERE

Suspected of Being Lone Bandit Who Held Up Tillamook Stage.

Matthew Jackson, the man arrested in San Francisco recently on the charge of robbing United States mails, is to be indicted by a federal grand jury in San Francisco and then brought to Portland to stand trial on the charge of being the lone bandit who on the evening of July 1 held up the Tillamook stage four miles out of North Yamhill and got away with the mail pouch and the passengers' valuables. The federal authorities are now convinced that he is the same man who held up a miners' train near Sterling, Cal., and relieved them of all that they had worth taking. He is also suspected of being responsible for most of the other stage robberies that have taken place within the past few weeks.
