

# FALL TIME, HUNTING BRING IN STRYTIME GIRL AND DOG TREE BIG B'AR FIVE MEN IN AT THE DEATH

### Canine Holds Bruin Prisoner While Mistress Gets Gun.

Helena, Mont., Sept. 1.—Hunters who go out after big game, particularly bear, this season will have to do exceedingly well to equal the record made by a young miss on the Lander fork of the Big Blackfoot. With the assistance of her dog, she made a bear take to a tree, while the dog kept bruin up the tree the child went after a gun.  
Mabel McConnell, the girl, resides with her mother and family at the site of the dam of the Lander Fork Power company. A few feet from the house the Big Blackfoot rushes by, and all about are rugged hills covered with pine trees. The child has a favorite dog which is her almost inseparable companion. The two climb the hills together, play on the banks of the stream, and where one is almost invariably with the other be located.  
A few days ago the two were playing in front of the house, not more than 100 feet from the dovecote. Suddenly the dog barked and Mabel saw a big black bear lumbering up the hill from the river. The dog and child both made after the bear. As the girl and dog ran toward the bear it took to a tree.  
"Hold him, Rover," said Mabel, and she ran back to the house intent on getting a gun. There was no one about, and she could not find it, but her cries brought two of the men not far away. Each got a gun, and going to the spot where the dog was holding the bear, they saw the bear clinging to the tree. Mabel's only regret after the bear was dead was that she had not done the shooting.

### Dispute Over Dead Buck's Carcass Settled by Night Marauders.

Tillamook, Or., Sept. 1.—Five Tillamook men who were yesterday divided on the question of the ownership of a deer are today bound together with a common purpose—the finding of the party or parties who stole the disputed game.  
The buck which has caused all the trouble is said to be the same chased by Julius Kruttschnitt, who failed to bag the animal. C. P. Clough, a passenger on the North Yamhill-Tillamook stage, first sighted the animal and called driver George's attention to it. The driver fired four shots at it. As he fired the fourth bullet the animal came along and fired two more bullets. Hines said he had been chasing the animal on foot.  
About the time Hines had finished his volley Jack Latmer, a barber, and Oak Nolan, a lawyer, both of this place, arrived and emptied the magazines of their rifles at the exciting buck, claiming they had been chasing it all day. Following them came a man by the name of Wilson who carried a rifle in his gun at the animal, said he was entitled to it because his gun had brought it down.  
There developed a lively argument as to who was entitled to the buck's carcass. It was tentatively settled by some of the passengers acting as arbiters. It was agreed to take the buck to the dwellings of Tollgate Keeper Jim Brown, where he is to be held and the remains apportioned among five hunters. The banquet was held, but during the small hours of the night the venison mysteriously vanished. The five hunters have sworn vengeance.

## PASTORS JOIN IN GRAFT PURSUIT

### They Attend Trials to Sustain Prosecution and Get the True Dope.

San Francisco, Sept. 1.—The Protestant ministry of San Francisco today rallied to the support of the graft prosecution by pledging attendance at trials now in progress. To show their good faith several clergymen were present at the proceedings in the Ruer case today.  
The new determination of the preacher followed the address delivered before the Citizens League of Justice yesterday by Professor R. H. Boko of the University of California. Boko played the court systems by which judges and juries can be led astray by conniving attorneys and spoke of the necessity of creating a public sentiment against the perversion of justice in this way.  
Walter MacArthur, a prominent labor leader, also spoke before the same hearing. The meeting was attended by 100 ministers, who unanimously voiced their indorsement of the graft prosecution and pledged their support of the trials for the purpose of encouraging the prosecutors.

## DEAD IN BURROW IN LUMBER YARD

### Old French Veteran Dies Pitifully of Destitution, at Frisco.

San Francisco, Sept. 1.—On a slab at the morgue today lies the body of Germain Mathieu, an aged veteran of the French army, who was found dead on a heap of straw in a lumber yard here yesterday, apparently the victim of destitution.  
The old man had constructed a rude shelter between piles of timbers in the lumber yard and, had evidently made his home there for some time. From a notebook found in his pocket it was learned that he had been a member of the 10th French Infantry, having enlisted from Alsace. He came to America in 1907 and reported to the French consul in San Francisco in that year.  
His body bore the signs of long illness and it is thought that, too ill to leave his humble abode, he perished of starvation.

## ADMIRAL GLASS AT POINT OF DEATH

Paso Robles Hot Springs, Cal., Sept. 1.—Rear Admiral Henry Glass, retired, former commander of the Pacific fleet, and his family arrived here today from Berkeley, whence Admiral Glass had been hurried as a last resort to save his life. Dr. Shields of Oakland, who accompanied the admiral, said today that he had hopes of his recovery.  
Admiral Glass was for years one of the best known naval commanders on the Pacific coast. He has lived in Berkeley since his retirement several years ago.  
Two months ago he was stricken with a complication of abdominal ailments and an operation was necessary to save his life. Since that time five physicians have been in constant attendance at his bedside.  
Yesterday he underwent a relapse and was removed here at once in the hope that the mud baths that cured Admiral Evans of his rheumatism might help him.

## LAND SUIT AGAINST COPPER KING GREENE

San Francisco, Sept. 1.—Dr. E. B. Perrin is awaiting the return from Honolulu of Colonel W. C. Greene, the Copper King of Cananea, Mexico, to serve as a witness in a suit against him for the recovery of \$112,000 for 32,000 acres of land in Arizona for which the defendant is alleged to have contracted. Papers in the case have been filed in the United States circuit court and will be served on Greene's arrival here.  
The transaction upon which suit is brought is alleged by Perrin to have taken place at Cananea, in the state of Sonora, Mexico, and concerned a tract of land that lies along the Babacomari river.  
Perrin claims that Greene promised to pay for the land on the delivery to him of an authenticated deed and that such a deed was delivered May 12, 1908.

## DESPONDENT SLAV ENDS HIS TROUBLES

San Francisco, Sept. 1.—Before the horror-stricken gaze of many people today in Jefferson square park, A. C. Ebelich, Slavonian, employed by the Moravian Order, committed suicide.
