PREACHERS TRY TO OUTROAR THE LION

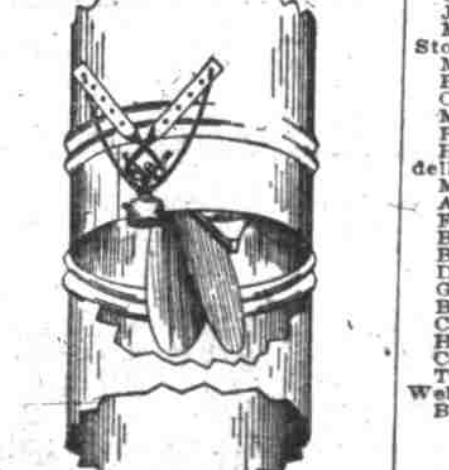

TWENTY TRAINS IN BLOCKADE SENATORS PUNCH FOR RUDDY GORE

Canadian Pacific Line Cut to Pieces in Manitoba—Thousands Marooned. Charge That West Virginia Togas Are Auctioned Starts the Mill.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Winnipeg, Man., Sept. 1.—Thousands of passengers on transcontinental trains of the Canadian Pacific are blocked today between Winnipeg and Thunder Bay. Over 20 heavily-laden passenger trains have been stalled by vast wash-outs which have swept miles of track from the mountain grades into the valleys. Several cloudbursts last night and this morning did more damage, and it is feared it will be days before even temporary tracks can be built around the dangerous places.

NEW FEEDER FOR ICE MARKET OF PORTLAND

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) The Dalles, Or., Sept. 1.—The Cascade Development company, with a capital stock of \$100,000, has filed its articles of incorporation in the county clerk's office here, the incorporators being A. W. Mohr and W. A. Johnston of The Dalles, and P. L. Caples of Portland. The object of the corporation is to build a power and ice plant near Weyth Station. It is estimated that Lindsay creek, near there, will furnish 600-horsepower, giving about a 450-foot fall. It is expected to have the ice plant, which will have a capacity of about 50 tons per day, in operation to supply the Portland market next spring.

ROADS ARGUMENT FOR MORE MILK AND HONEY

The Freight Rate Primer, issued by the management of the New York Central lines, is being distributed by W. C. Seachrest, local agent for the road in Portland. The little book is an argument for the equity of increased freight rates on such commodities as can stand the action, as shown by the illustration and statistics that the increase per capita would be of no infinitesimal amount per capita. The purpose of the pamphlet is to show to the public that an increase in freight rates of from 10 to 25 per cent on standard commodities would make no appreciable difference to the individual consumer while it would amount in the aggregate to a vast sum for the railroads and would insure extension and expansion of the business and construction of the roads of the country.

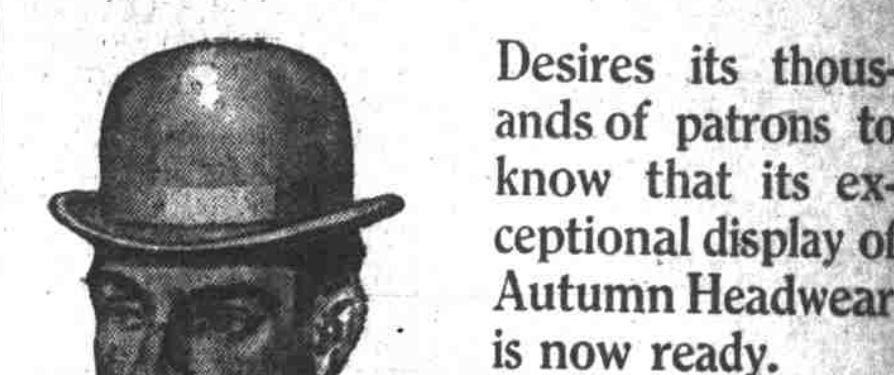

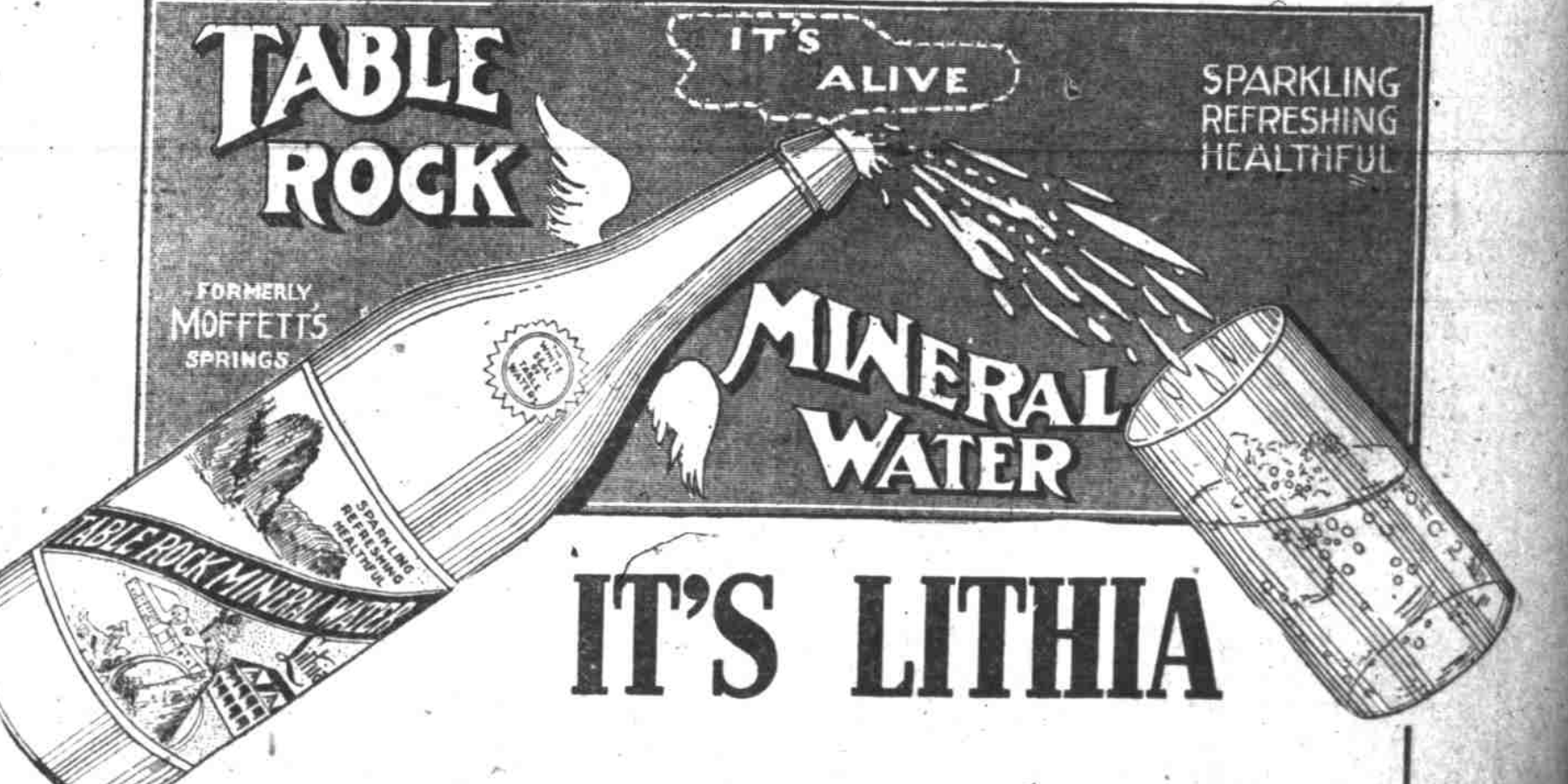
